

Mr. Hurd explained that the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen which is conducting a strike against the Pacific Greyhound lines was not an AFL union and declared that neither was it in good standing with other rail-way unions. He said President William Green of the AFL had issued orders to the state federations of labor and to the San Francisco labor council to support the Street, Electric Railway and Motor Coach Employes union
