A French war ministry spokesman said that 300,000 Belgian troops, representing the main force of the little country's 18 fighting divisions, quit in response to King Leopold III's unconditional surrender.

The refugee government in Paris "disowned" Leopold and announced it would organize its own army to fight at the side of the allies. The prospects were slim, however, for the Belgian government has only a mass of refugees, mostly women and children and but little manpower, to draw from.

British naval spokesmen hinted that the BEF was preparing to withdraw from the blood-soaked Flanders battlefield.

There were two hazardous routes of escape open:

1. Embarkation at still-held channel ports, certain to be subjected to frightful bombing and machine-gun strafing by the German air force.

2. A desperation-driven break through the German trap to join the allied army along the 200-mile Somme River front.

Hitler's mechanized legions struck hard new blows through the westward rim of France toward Britain, crossing the Scheldt canal northwest of Valenciennes, sweeping through the towns of Orchies and Douai, south of Lille, France, and advancing to the outskirts of Brussels, Belgium.

The huge force of allied "lost battalions" in Flanders was pocketed in an area roughly 52 miles wide at its base—extending from Gravelines to Zeebrugge—and about 55 miles deep on each side of a pear-shaped salient from Gravelines southeast to Lens and Douai, thence north in a ragged line to Menin, Thourout and Zeebrugge.

Andrews of Orlando was renominated United States senator from Florida and Spessard L. Holland of Bartow was nominated governor in Tuesday's runoff democratic primary.

Jerry W. Carter of Tallahassee, a member of the state railroad commission, conceded the victory to Andrews, advocate of a strong national defense program and supporter of most new deal policies. Carter had the backing of the Townsend organization.

Francis P. Whitehair, Deland attorney, admitted he had been defeated by Holland, 47-year-old silver-haired state senator and former county judge.

Unofficial returns from 985 of the state's 1,325 precincts in the senators race gave Andrews 196,091 and Carter 84,168. In the governor's race, 1,016 precincts gave Holland 179,564 and Whitehair 131,632.

Prairie Schooner Rose Float Motif

The 1940 Cherrien float in the Portland Rose festival parade will consist of a covered wagon, representing the Salem Centennial celebration, King Bing Kenneth Perry announced yesterday. Seven girls in Centennial costume will ride on the float, accompanied by a Cherrien honor guard, drill team, band, drum corps and the Salem Whitehairs.

Designed by George Otten, landscape architect for the state highway department, who planned prize-winning entries in 1927 and 1938, the 1940 float will be constructed and decorated by L. R. Breithaupt of Salem.

Blue and yellow iris, peonies, white sweet peas, roses, delphinium and white carnations will be set on a background of buckleberry and ferns.

Ambulances Fall Into Nazi Hands

BERLIN, May 28.—(AP)—German sources reported today that numerous American ambulances and hospital equipment have fallen into Nazi hands.

German wounded are using some of the American hospital facilities provided by the Franklin foundation.

The Voelkischer Beobachter said some American non-military personnel had been captured in the German advance.

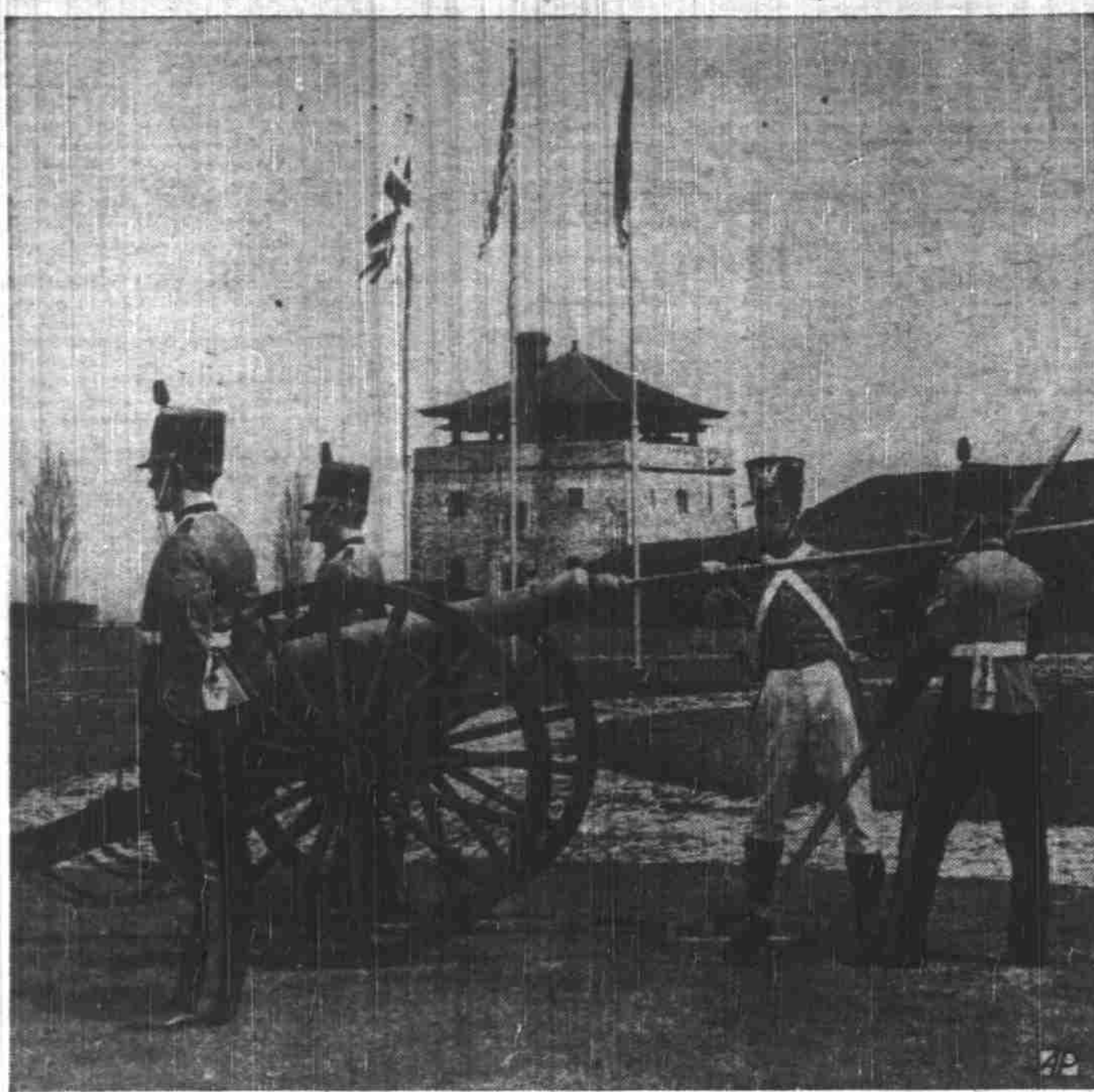

Italians Continue To Act Like War

ROME, May 29.—(Wednesday)—(AP)—Civilians began taking over some posts left by men called arms today, as the Belgian collapse on the northern front heightened Italy's war fervor and made active Italian intervention appear to be only a question of days.

Young fascists served as traffic police, and helmeted women and girls of Rome were seen in uniforms astride motorcycles equipped for anti-air raid duties.

At the same time the Italian press indicated that any chance of the French and British ever had of obtaining continued Italian non-belligerency by relaxing their blockade probably had been lost.

Spain also returned to Italian headlines with reports of anti-English demonstrations, together with reminders that Spain might see a chance now to recover Gibraltar.

The doors for unrestricted departure from Italy were closed last night on British and French nationals.

This insurance would indemnify in case of fire to the amount of the difference between the depreciated value of the building destroyed, covered by regular insurance, and the cost of replacing the building. Through it \$280,000 extra coverage could be obtained at a cost of about \$570 a year, according to figures prepared by insurance men. The matter was laid on the table for future consideration.

The buildings and grounds and finance committees were authorized to investigate the advisability of purchasing additional property east of the athletic field at the senior high school grounds.

Allied Hope Futile Says Hutchinson

STOCKHOLM, May 28.—(AP)—Norwegian and allied troops were reported tonight to have occupied part of the ruined city of Narvik in a fierce attack as the Germans retreated along the iron ore railroad to Sweden, destroying everything of military value.

Swedish newspaper correspondents at the border declared the Germans were concentrating their defenses near the frontier as allied and Norwegian troops, aided by gunfire from British destroyers, took over some points in the city and along Narvik fjord.

Border dispatches also reported that 30 German bombing planes attacked Bodo, to the south of Narvik, dropping more than 500 incendiary and light explosive bombs.

Trust Articles

Articles of incorporation were filed yesterday with the county clerk for the Ladd and Bush Company, and, in the form of supplemental articles of incorporation for the Ladd and Bush Trust Company, similar articles for the Pioneer Trust company.

Purpose of the Ladd and Bush company, capital stock for which is listed at \$1000 in \$100 shares, is reported as to act as agent in fiscal matters, and to deal in securities and bills of exchange.

Charter members were listed as A. N. Bush, H. V. Compton and E. O. Stadter, Jr., who also chartered the Pioneer Trust company for the purpose of acting as agent in fiscal transactions between individuals and corporate or public bodies, to act as trustee in various specified relationships, and to execute the powers and possess the privileges granted banks under state banking laws.

Among the latter are specifically included the right to loan money, take notes and issue drafts.

Organization of the Pioneer Trust company, which continues the Ladd and Bush Trust company under a new name, follows recent purchase of the Ladd and Bush bank by the United States National bank of Portland.

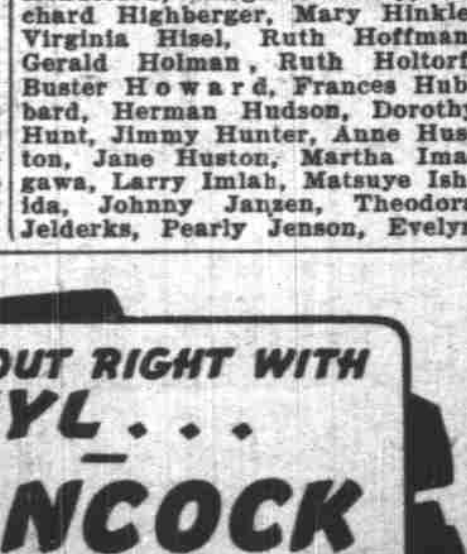

FDR Appoints Defense Board

10 per Cent "Super Tax" and Nuisance Levies, Finance Proposal

would pay \$1,000 under present law would find his tax bill raised to \$1,100 under the new law.

Other items in the proposed bill: An increase in the gasoline tax from 1 cent to 1 1/4 cents a gallon; an increase of \$1 a barrel in the \$5 rate on beer; an increase in the liquor tax from \$2.25 to \$3 a gallon and an increase in the cigarette tax from \$3 to \$3.50 per 1000.

All other excise taxes would be increased by a flat 10 per cent of the existing tax. Such taxes include levies on tobacco (other than cigarettes), cosmetics, jewelry, playing cards, etc.

The total increases would be calculated to raise \$682,000,000 annually.

Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich) predicted republicans generally would approve the idea of arranging to finance the defense program at once, although he added there might be "sharp disagreement" on details. Chairman Harrison (D-Miss) of the senate finance committee expressed belief the tax and borrowing program could be enacted and Congress adjourned by June 24, when the republican national convention is scheduled to meet.

Chains for Fliers Retaliatory Move

BERLIN, May 28.—(AP)—Captured French airmen henceforth will be clamped in chains immediately, Field Marshal Herman Wilhelm Goering announced tonight, in retaliation for similar treatment reported by a lieutenant-colonel of the Nazi air force.

A radio report said he specified also that "every time the murder of a German flier is reported" five captured French fliers will be shot and that for every report of firing on a Nazi parachuting from a damaged plane 10 enemy prisoners will be shot.

His order exempted the British because so far they have "not given cause for such retaliatory measures."

The Nazi air chieftain's announcement followed receipt of a report from Squadron Leader Lieut-Col. Lackner, who told of being fired upon by French troops as he parachuted to earth from his flaming plane, set upon and beaten, and finally rescued.

The officer was said to have been "temporarily a prisoner of war in French hands" and presumably escaped.

Garner Endorsed Noisy Convention

WACO, Texas, May 28.—(AP)—Texas' own John Nance Garner won the state's 46 votes to the democratic national convention today at a tumultuous assembly where fliers flew freely and angry shouts drowned out the words of the keynote speaker.

Finally brought to order by Former Gov. Pat M. Neff of Waco, now president of Baylor university, the unruly delegates quickly swung into line behind Garner-Roosevelt "harmony" forces.

Following the pattern drafted at the time the harmony agreement was reached, the convention unanimously endorsed the administration of President Roosevelt and directed that the delegation do nothing to embarrass the president.

The delegation, bound by the unit rule, was instructed specifically not to participate in any "anti-Roosevelt" or "stop Roosevelt" movement at the Chicago convention.

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
