NEW YORK, June 3-(AP)-Bear ish implications were seen in the war news today and stock market leaders retreated 1 to around

3 points. The list did fairly well at the start, with steels, coppers and specialties favored, but a lower drift soon got under way and quotations were at or near the lows of the day at the close.

It was the slowest full session since Feb. 26, only 445,705 shares changing hands compared with 526,760 last Friday. The first hour's turnover of 70,000 shares was the smallest for this period since last May. The Associated Press average of 60 issues was off .4 of a point at
