OCE Graduates 210 At Monmouth Tuesday

MONMOUTH — A total of 210 students were graduated Tuesday from Oregon College of Education for the school year. Fifty per cent of these have now obtained teaching positions for next year. The roll includes 49 men and 161 women. To date 27 men are placed and 84 women, making a total of 106 people who have signed contracts. Last year at this time 81 out of a total of 150 graduates had been placed.

With the placement season half over, it is expected that the remaining students will be placed before September. All 1939 graduates who wanted to teach were placed and present figures indicate that placement for 1940 should also reach a similar high mark.

On that day Father Maurus will be celebrant at a solemn high mass in the abbey chapel. The Very Rev. Jerome Wespe will act as presbyter assistant at the jubilee mass.

Rev. Gregory Robl and Rev. Charles Moser, Rt. Rev. Placidus Fuerst will preside at the organ. All those participating are pioneers with Father Maurus in the work of the Benedictines, although the jubilarian is the last living member of the first class to graduate on the hill.

Another well known priest of the Benedictines will also celebrate high mass on June 29. This will be the silver jubilee of Rev. Victor Rassier, on June 18.

Father Victor is the exponent of chant music in Oregon, having directed the choir of 500 boys who sang in the centennial mass in Portland in 1939 and the choir of 1000 children who sang for the confraternity of Christian doctrine in Portland this spring.
