Largest Logging Operation in Linn County Opened; Will Employ 35 Men

LEBANON—Ray Gleason went to Tacoma Tuesday to arrange about the sale of logs. He has just opened one of the largest logging projects in the county. Thirty five men will be employed most of the time the old Santiam CCC camp having been secured to house them. Three miles of private road have been built and are now being graded. This is up on Quartzville creek 30 miles east of Lebanon. The logs are hauled to Sweet Home and from there shipped by rail to Tacoma. It is hoped that there will be a local demand for these logs. They are white fir which is what is needed for plywood. There is a large stand of the white fir in this tract and the camp can probably operate for five or six years. Twelve trucks are already hauling.
