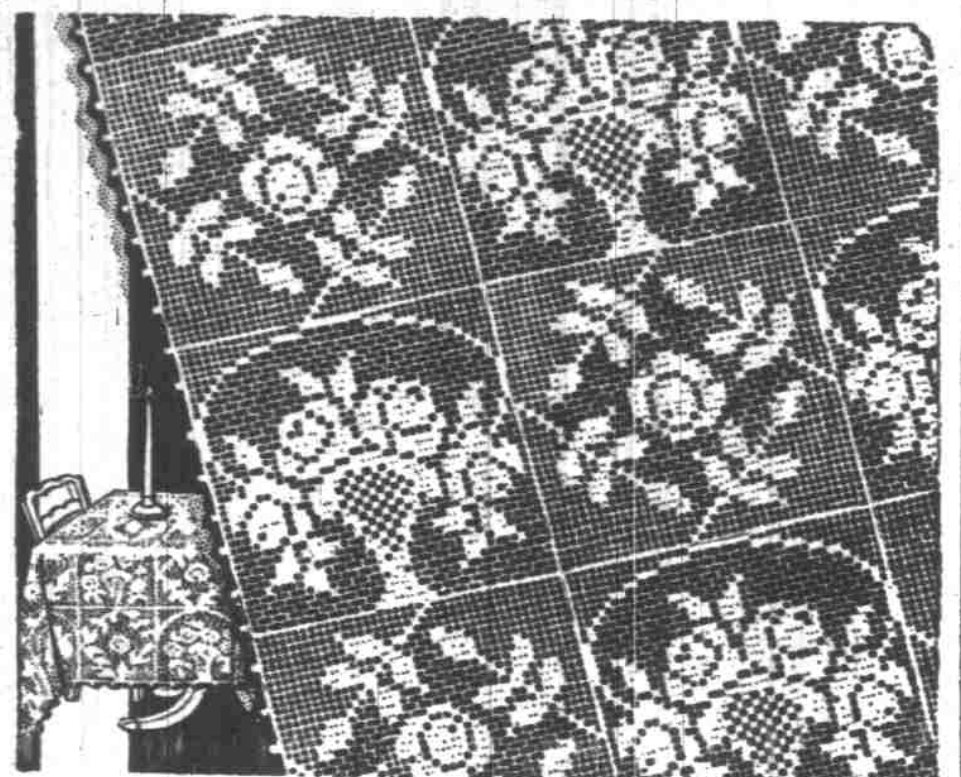
For going away the bride wore a navy blue ensemble with white accessories and a corsage of orchids.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 2 p. m. from the Weddle funeral parlor at Stayton with Rev. Melvin Traxler officiating. He was born June 28, 1882, in Missouri and came to Oregon in 1888. He moved from Medford to North Santiam in 1894 and had served several terms as school director and was a director of the mutual telephone line here at the time of his death.

In 1903 he was married to Myrtle VanNuy, who survives. One brother, Robert of North Santiam, also survives.

Bar Hears Case On Code Changes

A proposal to permit the Oregon supreme court to change the rules of civil procedure, now regulated by statute, was supported and opposed by speakers at a special meeting of the Marion County Bar association Tuesday at the Quella. A large part of the present state code of civil procedure has gone unchanged since its enactment in 1854.

Revision of the code by the supreme court was advocated by James Dezenendorf, Portland, chairman of the state bar committee on the subject. Randall Jones, Portland, also a member of this committee, spoke in opposition to such a change.

Stories of Early Schools Available

These Prepared for Master of Arts Degrees Are Published, U of O

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene.—The struggles, sometimes against almost overwhelming odds, of five early educational institutions in Oregon, are dramatically described in recent publications of the University of Oregon thesis series, now made available to the public. It was announced here by George N. Belknap, university editor. The histories in each case give complete details of the institutions from the time of founding to the present.

The five included are Philomath college, Pacific college in Newberg, Pacific university in Forest Grove, Dallas college formerly at Dallas, and Mt. Angel. Writers, who prepared the theses for their master of arts degrees, were C. G. Springer, Philomath; Amos Colfax Stanbrough, Pacific college; Watt Andrew Long, Pacific university; Nola Evelyn Coad, Dallas college, and Sister Ursula Rhodes, Mt. Angel.

The theses were reproduced through a works project administration project, and are available to those interested at a small cost, made to reimburse the state system of higher education for materials used. Inquiries should be addressed to the university at Eugene.

Barrel Shortage Causes Reduction In Berry Prices

Slashes have been made in some Marshall strawberry contracts, reducing prices from 4½ to 4 cents, growers said yesterday. Other canners are continuing 4½ and 5 cent prices. It is said. Shortage of barrels was blamed for the cut.

Strikes in Portland, Seattle and Toledo plants have tied up barrel construction and berries in some districts are being dumped because of lack of barrels.

No shortage of barrels is expected by the Williamette Cherry Growers, Inc., which have started barreling blings and will start on Royal Annes Monday, according to Manager Robert Shinn. The company has an adequate supply of barrels in storage, he said.

UO Offers Two Summer Sessions

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene.—Two summer sessions, lasting six and four weeks each and offering courses equivalent in character, method and credit values to the work of the regular academic year, will be offered during the summer months at the University of Oregon at Eugene. It is announced by Dr. Dan E. Clark, head of the department of history and director of the terms.

The six-week session will be held from June 17 to July 26, and the post session from July 29 to August 23, Dr. Clark points out. A number of new courses, a few of which were not announced in the summer session catalogue, will be offered. Students should register on the first day of the term they expect to attend. The summer session office on the campus at Eugene will supply complete information and catalogues.

Anne Hunt's Cooking School Opens Today at Salem Armory; Fashions, Foods, Appliances Are on Program

Seating accommodations for 1800 persons, and a public address system have been arranged for the three day Skewis & Judson Stewart-Warner cooking school under the direction of Miss Anne Hunt, nationally known home economist, which opens today at 2 p. m. in the Salem armory.

Miss Hunt, in addition to her qualification as a home economist, is a factory representative of the Stewart-Warner concern, makers of electrical appliances.

A short time ago she returned from Chicago, where she attended a special school conducted by her company for the purpose of developing an outlet for the newest cooking methods. She brings with her, for the first time to the west coast, these same ideas and she will talk about and demonstrate them during the school.

Miller's department store will present a fashion show daily, displaying the newest in sports wear, wash frocks and bathing suits. A special award will be given each day for the best centennial costume worn by persons attending, and music will be furnished by local talent.

The school will be conducted in an informal manner and at the completion of each class Miss Hunt will talk personally to women having special questions regarding cooking and home economics.

Each of 15 booths about the floor of the armory displaying food and household articles will be connected with the public address system and will broadcast at different times during the hours of 1 p. m. to 10 p. m. Many foods will be demonstrated.

A highlight of the program will be Miss Hunt's personal gift of recipes and the many food dishes she cooks during the classes. She urges women planning to attend the school at some time during the three days, to attend the first class, for she is confident they will wish to attend all remaining classes.

Given Day off to See Rose Festival

State employees here, in line with the practice of previous years, will be allowed one day to attend the Portland Rose festival. A large number of the employees will view the rose parade Friday while others will attend the festival Thursday and Saturday. All state offices will remain open and there will be no interruption of service.

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Baiting Advised For Berry Weevil

Baiting should be done now for strawberry root weevil, states Assistant County Agent Robert Rieder, as the pest is making its appearance in strawberry plantings on the valley floor.

Bait recommendations are either dried apple pomace or other commercial products containing some vegetable material and arsenate, or a home-made bait using the following formula: 60 pounds of bran, 5 gallons of water, 10 pounds of sugar, and 5 pounds of calcium arsenate.

Either of these baits should be applied at the rate of one teaspoonful to the plant and the bait should be placed down in the crown, not just dropped over the leaves. One hundred pounds of bait will treat 1, 2 or 3 acres

depending upon the distance between the plants.

The bait should be applied at once in the valley floor areas, and about June 10th in the hill areas, according to Mr. Rieder.

Second sprays are being applied now for cherry fruit fly, as recent rains have completely dissipated the first spray. The formula is: Five pounds lead arsenate; 5 gallons molasses; 100 gallons of water. Spray all cherries thoroughly, allowing the spray to fall on the upper surface of the leaves on all sides of the tree. A third spray should follow about a week or 10 days later on all late cherries as well as in-terplanted trees, and to Royal Annes, after harvest.

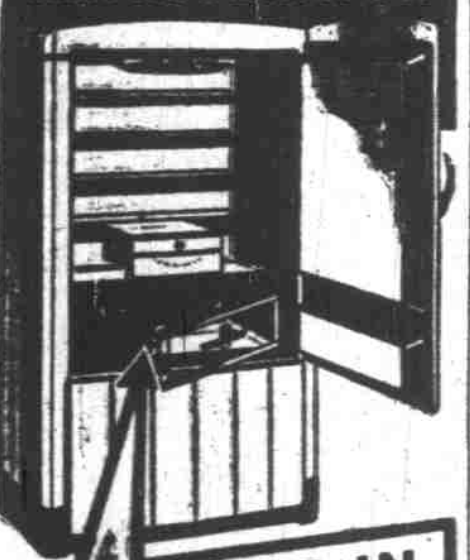
