Slayer's Appeal Denied, Arizona

PHOENIX, Ariz., June 6-(P)—Robert Burgunder's appeal from the death sentence was rejected by the Arizona supreme court today, and his execution was set for August 9.

Chief Justice Henry D. Ross declared the court was convinced that the 23-year-old murderer was given a fair trial and that he was sane when he shot and killed two Phoenix automobile salesmen as they lay bound on the desert April 29, 1929.

Burgunder was convicted of killing Jack Peterson, but was not tried on a charge of murdering Ellis M. Lorry.

The temperamental youth, on parole from a Washington state reformatory from a Seattle, Wash., drug store holdup, lost all of his money gambling while a student at Arizona State Teachers college at Tempe. Planning to leave the state, he obtained a car demonstration from Peterson and Lorry and killed them.

The slayer is the son of Robert M. Burgunder, former Seattle prosecuting attorney, who aided the defense at the trial.

Held at Roseburg On Theft Charges

ROSEBURG, June 6-(P)—A former state training school inmate, Clarence Moore Sider, 29, was in jail here today accused of armed burglary and automobile theft.

State Patrolman I. M. Wells said Sider was seen attempting to enter a Sutherland residence, but he escaped after holding the occupant, Mrs. Theodore Anderson, at the point of a pistol. Sutherland police broadcast a description, and the patrolman arrested him.

Sider was released from the training school last August after serving a term for automobile theft and burglary.

Remodeling Held More Profitable

Rehabilitation Assuming
Importance, Realtors
Told at Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6-(P)—There is more profit in rehabilitating and marketing existing houses than in building new ones,

Paul L. McCord of Indianapolis said today at the northwest regional conference of the National Association of Realty Boards.

"We have found that a house sells quicker, for a better price, to a better purchaser, and with a better net profit, when a thorough job of reconditioning is done," he said.

David L. Montanna of Chicago told the realtors that "with old houses now in competition with new houses for sale or rent, rehabilitation and its financing become a very important factor in

real estate marketing." Real Estate Steady
Many commodities and securities have fluctuated because of war conditions but real estate has maintained an even price, David B. Simpson of Portland declared. "The war will cause changes in real estate conditions but real property is unique in that the supply remains constant—demand changes, prices fluctuate but the supply does not change," he added.
He predicted expansion of commercial and residential construction and increase in employment.
