ASTORIA, Ore., June 6—(P)—Packers and fishermen sought the assistance of Oregon and Washington authorities today in studying the effects of pollution on Columbia river fishing.

Tom Sandoz, chairman, representative of the Columbia River Packers' association, said he would confer with M. B. Brennan, director of the Washington fisheries commission, to stimulate joint action by the Washington anti-stream pollution and Oregon sanitary boards.

Columbia fishermen complained a fibrous substance collected on nets and low water and hampered fishing operations.

Blind School Need Is Told; George Rhoten Chosen Club President

The Salem Lions club will urge the state Lions convention at Marshfield late this month to adopt a resolution urging the state to erect a one-story fireproof classroom building to replace the present frame structure at the state school for the blind here.

The club's convention delegates were so instructed yesterday, after Dr. W. W. Baum, chairman of the committee on sight conservation, had reported that the state fire marshal's office favored the improvement.

George A. Rhoten, local attorney, was elected president of the club to succeed Glenn Gregg. Other new officers will be Virgil T. Golden, first vice-president; R. W. "Joe" Land, second vice-president; Edward Majek, third vice-president; J. Fuhrer and Wayne Doughton, directors.

Assertions made before the Salem chamber of commerce during a recent legislative session that the capital city is inhospitable were declared untrue by Acting Governor E. R. Fatland, who spoke briefly at the Lions luncheon.

"There is no justification for criticism concerning hospitality of Salem, either as a municipality or as individual residents," Fatland declared.

Dewey Given 1842 Oregon Write-ins

646 Republican and 491 Democratic go to Downey

Thomas A. Dewey's name was written in 1842 times in the Oregon primary election for republican vice-presidential nomination, and Charles L. McNary's 1929, the state elections bureau reported yesterday. The figures were taken from returns from 29 of 36 counties.

Sheridan Downey received 646 votes, Robert Taft 395, Herbert Hoover 226, Arthur Vandenberg 88, Robert M. LaFollette, Jr., 36, and Wendell Wilkie 20. Counties not yet reporting on the preferential republican vice-presidential vote include Baker, Crook, Jefferson, Lake, Sherman, Walla and Wheeler. Robert M. LaFollette, Jr., received 2416 write-in preferential votes for democratic vice-president with six counties missing. Louis Johnson received 2121 votes, John N. Garner 1984, James A. Farley 743, Cordell Hull, 546, Sheridan Downey 491, Paul V. McNatt 289, Burton K. Wheeler 269, and C. L. McNary 40. Counties yet to report democratic returns for vice-president are Baker, Crook, Curry, Lake, Sherman and Walla.
