### Jury Selected In Scott Case

#### Alleged Accident in River Is Basis of Demand for Damages

Selection of a jury, opening statements and plaintiff's preliminary testimony occupied the first day yesterday of the damages trial of Mae O. Scott vs. Don Madison before Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan.

The plaintiff has sought damages for injuries allegedly sustained when she was cut by the propeller of defendant's motor boat when she assertedly was forced to dive from the craft at Madison's behest.

She maintains that muscles and nerves of the right leg were permanently injured by the accident.

Madison, through his attorneys, has alleged that the plaintiff was one of seven girls taken aboard his motor boat at their own request, and that in diving off, the plaintiff disregarded his warning.

The jury yesterday inspected the outboard motor itself, and today will visit the scene of the accident in the Willamette river.

That made quite a difference in several paragraphs of Bronson's book, so he hurried back the corrections in the proof—but the book was already printed and bound, and on the market.

Some copies, in public libraries, have been corrected, as all ought to be. In the Oregon State Library, for one, the corrections were made.

The Bronson book has several paragraphs covering the period of Narcissa Whitman's visit to the lower country in 1845, giving new light, and additional facts. One of these follows:  
"One of the memorable activities of Jason Lee during the summer of 1843 was his inauguration of the first camp meeting for white settlers held on the Pacific slope. This religious gathering assembled in the attractive portion of Old Oregon known as the Tualatin Plains, 35 miles west of Willamette Falls.

The missionaries pitched their tents under the shelter of three giant trees, two towering firs and one a stately oak.  
"Jason Lee, Gustavus Hines and H. K. W. Perkins, the prominent Methodist present; and Harvey Clark, the popular Congregational minister who had settled on the Tualatin Plains in 1841, were in charge of the meeting."
