### \$1000 Damage Award Verdict

#### Injury in Dive From Boat Basis; Scott-Madison Trial Concluded

A jury yesterday awarded \$1000 damages to the plaintiff in the case of Mae O. Scott vs. Don Madison, which has been on trial in circuit court for three days before Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan.

The suit resulted from injuries received by the plaintiff when she dived from Madison's motor boat into the Willamette river last summer.

### Board Jurisdiction Clarified in Ruling

The state board of barber examiners has no authority to refuse to grant licenses to barbers and shops merely because they are not located in substantial, permanent buildings, Attorney General I. H. VanWinkle ruled Wednesday.

VanWinkle also held that the board has jurisdiction over sanitary conditions in barber shops and may revoke a license when such sanitary conditions do not comply with the law.

The opinion was requested by J. G. Risley, secretary-treasurer of the board, in connection with barber shops located in trucks and trailers.

### Descendants of Pioneers Featured In Opening Scenes of Centennial Pageant; Screens to Be Innovation

Doris Smith, pageant director of the Salem Centennial, today announced that cycle one of the pageant would present direct descendants of early Salem pioneer families. The opening scene brings to the platform the march of the years, beginning with a little six-year-old girl and ranging upward to the present day.

Miss Eula McCully has been placed in charge of this division of the pageant and she has asked that all persons interested in having their children participate in this phase of the pageant, call her at 6244.

It is necessary to use little girls as much as possible, although in cases where small boys are directly descended from pioneer Salem families, they too will be placed in this scene.

Another interesting idea for dramatizing the march of the years will be the incorporating in the scenery of screens which will illuminate to present "then and now" pictures of the progress of the city. This idea has never before been used, and it is expected to attract nationwide attention as a direct departure from usual stage procedure in pageantry.

Plans for the building of the 300-foot-long stage are well under way according to Ray Stumbo, who heads the scenic sketches have been submitted, and definite scale drawings are now being made. Scenery will depict the Waldo Hills, colored in shades of purple and blue. The back scenery will be intertwined with ramps for horsemen and wagons to move from level to level. The pageant will be staged at the fairgrounds on July 31, August 1, 2, 3.

### Use of Electricity In Cooking Gains

Connections of Stoves and Water Heaters Show 52 Per Cent Increase

Use of electricity for cooking and water heating in this area is increasing more rapidly than at any time since electric ranges and water heaters were placed on the market, according to W. M. Hamilton, Willamette valley division manager for Portland General Electric company.

Connections of ranges and water heaters to PGE lines in this territory during the first five months of 1946 have shown an increase of 52 per cent over the same period last year, Hamilton states.
