Lamb cakes
French fried potatoes
Buttered cauliflower

2 cups sifted flour
4 teaspoons phosphate baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons shortening
1/4 cup pie cherries and juice
Sift dry ingredients together. Work in shortening until mixture is granular. Add berries and juice and stir until berries are mixed through dough. Drop by spoonful in greased muffin pans. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees) for 15 minutes. Serve hot with whipped cream or lemon sauce.

Grill Menu Good Right Now

- Outdoor grills or campfires work overtime this month, so you needn't work much at all. A quick, new novel "one piece" dish is this:
SUPPER PANCAKES
2 eggs
1 1/2 cups milk
2 cups flour
2 tablespoons baking powder
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
1/2 cup melted fat
15 slices boiled ham or cheese
Beat eggs, add milk and mix well. Sift flour with baking powder, salt and mustard; add to first mixture, stirring until flour disappears. Add melted fat and cooled fat and oil-blan. Dip ham or cheese slices in batter and bake on hot griddle. Season slightly with salt and paprika. Fold second half over top, pocket-book fashion, press edges together. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) about 20 minutes.

Add 3 tablespoons ground coffee to 1/2 cup of milk and bring to boiling point. Let stand 10 minutes. Strain through cheese cloth. Cool. Whip 1 cup heavy cream until thick, add 3 tablespoons powdered sugar, 1/4 teaspoon vanilla and cold coffee mixture. Mix well and serve on warm gingerbread. Serves 9.
