Death of Bell Basis of Suit

Three Defendants Named in \$10,000 Damage Action Here

A \$10,000 damage action was instituted yesterday by Carma Bell as administratrix of the estate of John L. Bell against George E. Hoffman, Claude W. Gifford and Frank E. Brown.

The complaint, made on behalf of Steve J. Bell, minor and heir of deceased, states that the latter suffered from infection after having a tooth removed last August by Hoffman, a dentist, and that he was advised on that account to consult Gifford, also a dentist.

It alleges that Brown was later called for consultation, and that gas was administered to Bell as an anesthetic. The latter died in not more than a minute after inhaling the gas, the complaint states, and alleges that his physical condition was such as to make it impossible for him to stand the effects of the gas.

Car Registration Record Set Here

Registration of motor vehicles in Oregon at the end of May aggregated one for every three persons in the state, Secretary of State Earl Snell reported Thursday.

Motor vehicle registrations on May 31 reached 21,820, an increase of 5.91 per cent over those for the same period last year. Registration fees totaled \$2,453,495.93.

Private cars numbered 298,139 or 5.39 per cent in excess of the registration for the same period last year. This established a new high record in Oregon.

Wilson Will Try McReynolds Case

McReynolds was arrested last Monday. Judge Wilson will substitute for Judge T. E. J. Duffy of Deschutes county.

Deadline Is Near On Job Insurance

Penalty May Be Saved by Prompt Payment Is Word of Gaiser

Employers who failed to secure full credit offset under the federal social security act for contribution of 1939 wages to Oregon's unemployment compensa-

tion commission still may save 90 per cent of the heavy penalty if they pay the state before June 30, 1940, Elias Gaiser, administrator, announced Thursday.

Gaiser pointed out that employers of eight or more persons are liable to many thousands of dollars in penalties unless the jobless insurance tax is settled this month.

Under the social security act the 2.7 per cent state payroll tax may be deducted as full credit offset from the 3 per cent federal

tax if paid before January 31 of the following year. Five months additional have been allowed by congress in which an offset of nine-tenths of the 2.7 per cent could be claimed.

This additional time expires June 30, after which the employer must pay the full 3 per cent to the government besides paying 2.7 per cent to the state, Gaiser said.

Gaiser said he was sure that the few employers affected would do everything possible to clear up any delinquencies.
