Safety Council Hits Enforcement Laxity

SILVERTON—Laxity in the enforcement of city safety laws at Silverton was severely criticized at the Thursday night meeting of the Silverton safety council, presided over by Norman Nagell and of which Lester Rue is secretary.

We have had one recent death of a boy riding a bicycle. How many do we have to have before the local officials and officers realize that our bicycle ordinance is a law to be enforced for safety's sake? one member asked. It was pointed out that bicycle riders have no more right to "cut-in" in the middle of a block than do automobile drivers. Bicycle riders, it was said, should follow the line of traffic. And yet, another member stated, boys and girls on bicycles were seen swerving in and out of traffic on the Silverton streets frequently.

A resolution will be presented to the city council asking that this matter be given more close attention before further fatal accidents occur in the city.

The top frequent failure to stop on Oak and Mill street intersection was also brought to the attention of the safety council. It was recalled that an accident had occurred at that intersection Saturday night. While a stop sign should stop motorists on Mill before coming on to Oak, it was remarked, the stop sign is badly shadowed by a sign on the parking. This same shroud, other members stated, obstructed the view when coming on to Oak street. The shroud should be condemned and taken out in the intersection. The safety council members of the safety council members.

The double parking on downtown streets on Saturday night also came in for criticism. Local officers will be asked, through a resolution passed Thursday night, to prevent at least some of the double parking on the most crowded streets such as Water and Main streets.

Alfred Adams, local theatre owner, was highly complimented for permitting the public to use the parking lot he had provided. No criticism was being made on this to date, it was stated.

The fact that little has been done to relieve congestion on Sunday mornings in front of Immanuel church, the Missionary Alliance and Trinity church, the Methodist church, came in for criticism also. Churches, in the interest of safety, should provide parking lots, members of the council stated. It was pointed out that Trinity church, which has a somewhat relieved the traffic but some form of parking, such as providing courtesy police from the Sunday schools, might be working out. It was suggested that the Methodist church might be induced to turn the vacant lot at its west into a parking lot for church members.

Former Teacher Visits Silverton

This laboratory was first created a little over a year and a half ago and Goets is its first chief. During this period over 70,000 tests had been made. The majority of tests, Goets said, were made on young people between 16 and 25 years. Juniors and seniors in the Portland high schools were given an opportunity to take the tests, he explained.

"While there is still much to be learned and desired in the tests," Mr. Goets remarked, "it is still remarkable how much can be learned from them." He pointed out that the tests showed the aptness of one tested for different occupations.
