

FDR Promises To Double Aid

But Points out Congress Reserves Sole Power to Declare War

"What a high place ideals hold" in the life of the American people, and asked:

"Will they hesitate still to declare themselves against Nazi Germany?"

This question was interpreted by many as a plea for the United States to declare war on Germany.

Mr. Roosevelt's message was made public in the late afternoon. Earlier, the chief executive had conferred for 70 minutes with the British and French ambassadors, Lord Lothian and Count de St. Quentin. White House attaches said, however, that the message had been dispatched prior to this conference.

Details of the president's talk with the two envoys were not disclosed, but Lord Lothian said the question of further aid to the allies was discussed. Certain points were "cleared up," he said, but no decisions reached.

Defense Program Is Pressed Ahead

At the capitol and in government departments, this country's own defense program was pressed ahead.

The navy announced award of a \$3,489,308 order for airplane engines to the Ranger aircraft engine division of the Fairchild Engine and Airplane corporation.

The federal power commission announced that on instructions from President Roosevelt, it would survey power needs and, in cooperation with other agencies, work out plans to protect the power supply against hostile acts.

The senate approved and sent to the White House a bill intended to expedite warship building. It provides for cancellation of the navy's bureau of engineering and its bureau of construction in an effort to cut red tape.

The senate finance committee approved a \$1,007,000,000 tax defense bill.

The senate itself worked late to complete action of a measure giving the Reconstruction Finance corporation broad powers to finance production of war materials. The house approved the bill yesterday.

The senate passed the measure late in the day, but in an amended form, thus necessitating its return to the house for action on the senate changes.

Jesse Jones, federal loan administrator, told reporters that as soon as the legislation became law he would make funds available for certain aircraft production needs.

Prison Officials Watch Salmon Run

Salmon, for the first time in several years, were running in Mill creek, within the state penitentiary walls here this week, prison officials reported Saturday.

One salmon, more aggressive than the others, was held by a turbine, was said to have jumped up on a plank alongside the creek.

Maneuvers of the salmon were witnessed by members of the state parole board, a number of convicts and penitentiary officials.

Turkey's Foreign Policy Unchanged

ANKARA, Turkey, June 15.—(AP)—The government informed all foreign envoys tonight that Turkey's foreign policy remains unchanged and that for the present she will continue her nonbelligerent status.

The notice was given after Soviet Russia, informed sources said, had made known to Ankara that Moscow would prefer that Turkey not enter the war on the grounds of extension of the war to the Balkans was "undesirable."

The Russian expression was accepted here as evidence of a definite understanding among Germany, Italy and Russia regarding the Balkans.

American Killed, Finn Air Mishap

HELSINKI, June 15.—(AP)—An unidentified American and all the eight others aboard were killed Friday when a Finnish passenger plane enroute from Tallinn, Estonia, exploded in mid-air and fell into the Gulf of Finland.

Besides the American and two Finnish crewmen, those aboard were said to include two Frenchmen, two Germans, two Swedes and one Estonian.

The Oregon delegation to vote for a republican as a vice-presidential candidate.

The Oregon Commonwealth Federation backed LaPollette in the primary and federation members among the delegates bitterly denounced the resolution for Johnson as "un-American, unpatriotic, and above all undemocratic."

Monroe Sweetland, secretary of the Commonwealth Federation, said that "not since the notorious McCamant case has any Oregon delegate dared to defy the instruction of his party's voters." David C. Epps and Gus Solomon, Commonwealth members among the delegates, declared against the Johnson endorsement and Epps asserted he would vote for LaPollette in any event. Epps declared also he would not be governed by the delegation's 7-3 vote for the unit rule to govern voting.

The delegates elected John J. Beckman, Multnomah county, to the resolutions and platform committee of the national convention, 6-3, over S. Stephenson Smith, Eugene, Commonwealth president.

J. F. Ulrich of Salem won a place on the credentials committee and Harry D. Boivin, Klamath Falls, on the rules committee, with the delegation.

Three-Fifths GOP Votes; Primaries

Approximately 60 per cent of the republicans and 47 per cent of the democrats, based on the registration figures, voted at the recent primary election in Oregon, Dave O'Hara, in charge of the state elections bureau, reported Saturday.

Official canvass of the primary vote was completed here Friday. O'Hara estimated the republican vote at 165,864 against a republican registration of 276,246. The democratic vote was estimated at 119,252, compared to the democratic registration of 264,249.

The total republican vote for state treasurer was 150,864 and the democratic vote 119,152.

The accident occurred when a truck driven by Jack S. Witt, Salem, and the Chapman car crashed head-on near the Tolo overhead bridge.

No charges have been filed, the state police report.

Felony Attempt Charge Faced in Justice Court

Elsewhere Retreat Goes on; Alsace Invaded in Nazi Advance

Louviers, 50 miles southeast of German-held Le Havre.

There is no chance now of a cessation of hostilities, declared a Nazi spokesman. "France and England wanted this war. Now they have it."

The Reynaud government was in session for three and one-half hours, "somewhere in France," presumably at or near Bordeaux, where the ministers considered their republic's grave position.

They are to meet again today, apparently to consider President Roosevelt's reply to Reynaud's "final" appeal for help.

Italy felt the weight of naval war and declared her troops had driven across the Alpine frontier to occupy French territory.

The Italians said the French lost a destroyer at Genoa, where a single Italian torpedo boat and coastal batteries torpedoes off an attack of nine French warships.

Italy's military experts explained an Italian advance over the Alpine frontier as a part of the plan for final conquest of France by Germany and Italy.

Arming "Everybody" Talked in London

Britain's fear of Nazi invasion led to the calling of a meeting of a parliament group to consider arming everybody, even women and boys "who can throw a ball" with "hand grenades, bombs, pistols—anything."

Italian and British troops fought on the Egyptian-Libyan frontier.

The British claimed capture of the Italian forts of Caprazzo and Maddalena. Royal Air Force attacks on Libyan and Italian East African positions continued.

Switzerland posted flaring, black lettered warnings against parachute invasion. An increase in Switzerland's defense preparations indicated that the Swiss intelligence service had turned up disquieting information.

Over 1000 Placed In Salem in Week

soon is taken for granted.

(The Tribune De Geneve of Geneva, Switzerland, carried a special Paris dispatch tonight saying that German troops were busy "preparing the palace of Versailles for the arrival of Chancellor Hitler.")

We arrived last night, in this city that seems dead, I just do not recognize Paris again. Seventy per cent of its population has fled.

From the Hotel Crillon, where once President Wilson of the United States addressed French crowds, the swastika is flying.

The banner also is flying from atop the Quai D'Orsay. (The French foreign office; from the Arc de Triumphant, under which lies buried France's most busy soldier of the World war; from the historic city hall; and from the Eiffel tower.

It all seems unreal, like an Arabian nights tale come to life.

On first entering Paris last night, we drove to the tomb of the unknown soldier in the twilight.

As a background to the Arc de Triumphant, the sky was disfigured by an enormous ugly cloud of smoke emanating from the region around St. Germain.

That suburb apparently was in flames from artillery fire.

It was about 9 p. m.—and the Arc was bathed in a mellow, red-dish light.

Before the tomb of "Un Soldat Inconnu" were standing old women, young women, bearded old men, boys in their teens. Many of the old women were sobbing softly.

Never could one forget that deeply touching scene.

As we approached the tomb in company of our guides from the army their looks hardened for a moment. They appeared to relax somewhat, however, when the German officers removed their caps, stood still, then saluted the symbol of the brave French soldierly bud there.

to the far eastern and frontier. Berlin dispatches reported that upon acceptance of the ultimatum, men of the red army began marching into Lithuania this afternoon, meeting no resistance.

(These dispatches announced the crossing into Lithuania at 3 p. m. of "one soviet Russian army" at Elisechkie, Druskenski, Durkenen and Laskists.

Russian troops, it was added, were occupying the cities of Vilna, Kaunas, Schaahlen, Ponjwiesch and Rasevny. Other places would be decided in a meeting between Soviet General Pawlow and the Lithuanian commanding general.

(A Russian force of 200 tanks was said to have passed Kaunas, the capital, while the main force of an armored division arrived in the city itself. The people apparently were astonished and it was reported that food stores were stormed in a panic.)

It was on the basis of the mutual assistance pact signed on October 10, 1939, after Russia's seizure of eastern Polish territory while Germany was occupying its western sections, that Moscow moved suddenly today.

Slaying Revealed In Spokane Hotel

SPOKANE, Wash., June 15.—(AP)—The badly beaten, unclad body of a woman, found Friday at the bottom of a hotel elevator shaft, was identified later as that of Mrs. Jessie Sellers, 48, a beauty parlor operator.

Coroner Dr. I. B. Collins said a friend who remembered she had not seen Mrs. Sellers for several days called the sheriff's office after reading the newspaper account of the slaying.

She reported she and Mrs. Sellers had attempted to purchase the beauty parlor in the basement of the hotel, but that the sale had "fallen through," the coroner said.

Mrs. Sellers' daughter, Mrs. Marian Ilse, was called and identified the body, which had been beaten by a yon o. recognition, through scraps of clothing found beside it in the pit.

Pros. Carl Quackenbush previously had established the beauty parlor, which is near the elevator, as the probable scene of the killing, and asked police in other cities to search for a negro porter who disappeared Tuesday.

Poland, to Finland, and to Norway—we have encouraged them to hope for help we cannot send."

He contended that it was "useless to talk of sending American troops to Europe now, for we would need months of preparation before we could train and equip even a small army."

If Germany wins, he argued, Europe would be dominated by "the strongest military nation the world has ever known" and if we entered the war we "must be prepared to attack that nation."

He charged that an "organized minority in this country is flooding our congress and our press with propaganda for war," spending large sums, "pushing up closer and closer to the edge."

This nation, he said, "stands today where the road divides, at the signpost of war and peace."

Should it choose war, he added, it would mortgage "the lives of our children and grandchildren," and "every family in the land would have its wounded and its dead."

"Now that we have become one of the world's greatest nations, shall we throw away the independent American destiny which our forefathers gave their lives to win?" he asked. "Shall we submerge our future in the endless wars of the old world? Or shall we build our own defenses and leave European war to European countries?"
