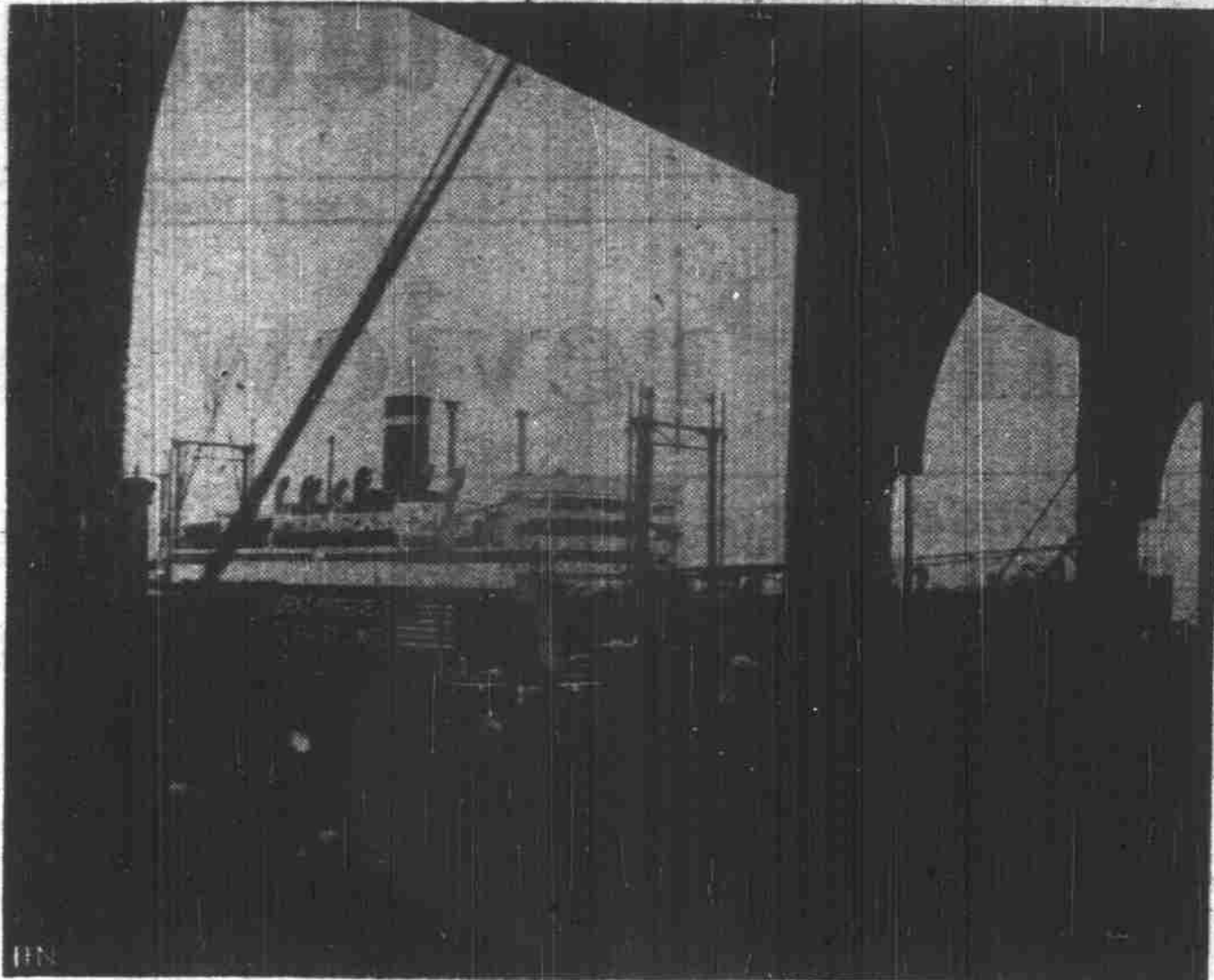
Gets Promotion

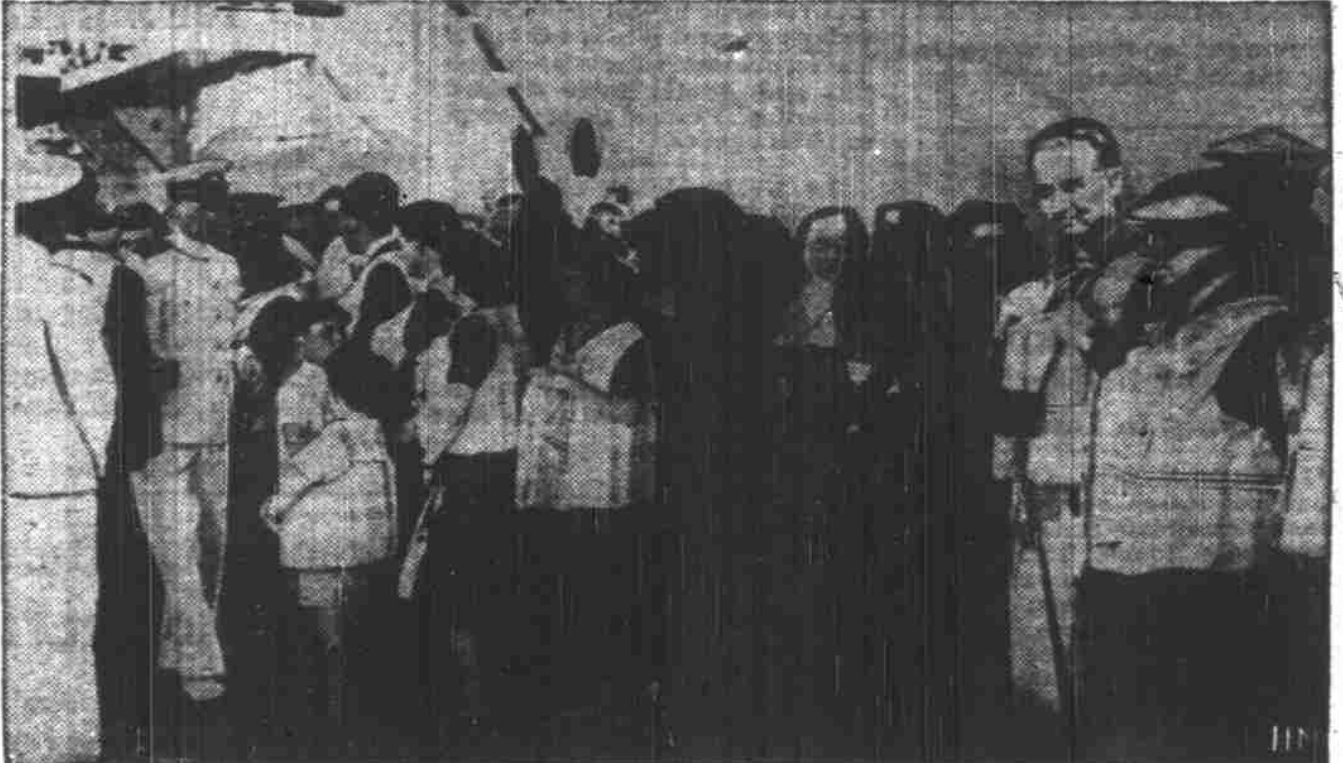

Nearly 100 Descendants of Pioneer Family Have Reunion at King Valley

KINGS VALLEY—About 100 descendants of the pioneer family of Naham King met for their annual reunion Sunday at the old Chambers place a short distance south of the Kings Valley store.

Naham King, with his wife and children, some with families of their own crossed the plains in 1845 in a party which consisted of 65 wagons, under command of Captain Tevatt and Stephen Meeks. After six months of hardship on the trail they arrived at Gale creek, near Forest Grove, where they settled for the winter. The following spring, Naham King moved on and finally settled in the valley in Benton county which now bears his name. Two of his sons-in-law, Lucious Norton and Rowland Chambers, also settled in the valley and Chambers later put up the Kings Valley grist mill.

King later moved to Portland for a year, then back to a 60-acre farm near Wren's station where he remained until his death in 1857.
