"Battle of Britain" May Be Under Way; French Continue to Fight

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claimed the dawn of the "Battle of Britain." He declared the navy and royal air force could smash any invading force in the channel and the 1,750,000 land defense forces, backed up by Canadian armies already on British soil, could finish off any invaders who did succeed in landing.

"If we stand up to him (Hitler) all Europe may be freed and the life of the world may move forward in broad, sunlit uplands, Churchill said.

"But if we fail the whole world, including the United States, will sink into the abyss of a new dark age made more sinister and perhaps more prolonged by the lights of a perverted science."

Although admitting the loss of the battle of France, Churchill urged the French to fight on, to sign no separate peace.

There still was no hint of the probable disposition of the French fleet, which might possibly prove the winning factor of the war.

Fascists in Rome served notice that in any circumstances, the axis powers would lay down peace terms aimed at wiping British influence from the European continent for good and all.

German motorized units plunged on southward. Heavy fighting raged around Orleans, scene of Joan of Arc's greatest military triumph. The Germans said they had captured the city. There also was heavy fighting at La Charite Sur Loire and in the region around Dijon and Autun.

The French dynamited a four-mile long railroad tunnel in the Jura mountains near the Swiss frontier in an apparent effort to pin the eastern wing of their line to the mountains.

German forces failed in an attempt to slice through the reorganized French army in the southern Juras for union with Italian forces in the southern Alps.

British bombers made new raids against western Germany and swapped blows with the Italians in Africa and the Mediterranean.

The nazis apparently had captured 50,000 to 100,000, leaving 400,000 or more of the 1,000,000 Maginot line men still surrounded or trying to cut their way out.

The French troops at Saint Point dynamited the four-mile long railroad tunnel under Golden mountain, which emerges in Switzerland.

The French said they had brought with them all the munitions stored in the underground forts which they could load on trucks and private cars.

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young and old, formed on the sidewalks. Thousands of troops stood in solid rows upon the streets. Men and women marched singing about the city.

Mussolini arrived three hours later, at 3 p. m. (5 a. m. PST). With the manner of an old friend, Hitler met him at the railway station.

They reviewed an honor guard briefly and then, each in his own automobile, moved away in a parade going on to the fuhrerhaus, Hitler going on to the fuhrerhaus—his palace of stone—and Mussolini to the Prinz Karl palace to rest briefly.

Less than an hour later, Joachim von Ribbentrop, the German foreign minister, called at the palace for the Italian head of the axis and they drove together to Hitler's house.

The crowd roared "Heil! Heil Duce!" Mussolini himself smiled this time.

Arrived at the fuhrerhaus, he was met at the gates by Hitler and then taken into the study where the two men fell to discussing what was to happen to the republic of France.

While Hitler and Mussolini and their foreign ministers were discussing the great question as to how much France is to be asked to sacrifice, German and Italian legal and economic experts were busy, too, in other conferences.

There was a pre-election rumor that forces opposed to the school board's order requiring a salute to the flag in all schools were plotting a write-in campaign.

Ellison was the only regularly nominated candidate.

Liquor Commission Will Meet Today

This month's meeting of the state liquor control commission will be divided between Portland and Salem, officials announced here yesterday.

The commission will open its sessions in Portland today and then come to Salem for an all-day meeting Thursday. Commission members will confer with Governor Charles A. Sprague Thursday afternoon.

Reports received here Tuesday indicated that the commission is now studying a new price schedule to meet additional liquor taxes recently levied by the federal government for national defense purposes.

It was indicated that prices on some liquors will be increased as much as 25 per cent.

OSC to Take More In Training Course

An opportunity for Salem men between 18 and 26 to take ground school training in aviation at Oregon State college was offered here yesterday.

Only half of Oregon State's quota of 60 in the CAA training program is filled, it was said, and vacancies will be made up with students from outside that area.

Ground school instruction starts June 24. Those passing ground school examination with satisfactory grades will be given flight training at the Albany airport. All expenses are borne by the government.

Bend Ex-Recorder Gets Prison Term

BEND, June 18-(P)-L. G. McReynolds, former Bend recorder and treasurer, pleaded guilty to larceny of \$296.48 in public funds Monday and was sentenced to five years in the state penitentiary by Circuit Judge Fred W. Wilson.

District Attorney Bert C. Boylan told the court that the total shortage was "at least \$9000." A state audit has not been completed.

The house itself meanwhile passed a resolution previously approved by the senate declaring that the United States would not "acquiesce" in the transfer of territory in this hemisphere from one non-American nation to another.

The vote was 382 to 8 with six voting "present."

The senate spent the day debating the \$1,007,000,000 defense tax bill. It eliminated from the measure a number of amendments which would have required a flat 10 per cent reduction in all government expenses for non-defense items and would have terminated the treasury's foreign silver purchases.

Chairman Pittman (D-Nev) of the foreign relations committee sought unanimous consent to put aside the tax bill long enough to pass a neutrality act amendment which would permit Red Cross relief ships to enter war zones, but was blocked by Senator Holt (D-WVa) who protested that the sinking of such a ship "might be the spark that would get this country into war. The house foreign affairs committee had approved the measure.

ONG Is Shooting Big Guns, Clatsop

CAMP CLATSOP, June 18-(P)-A bobbing target in the seas off Clatsop pit was the target today of the 24th coast artillery of the Oregon national guard.

Twelve-inch mortars belched 1100-pound sand-filled projectiles and 10-inch rifles spouted 550-pound shells far out to sea.

Anti-aircraft firing is being emphasized at the two-week drill.

The woman told Sheriff A. Donley Barnes of Grants Pass that she was driven to the California line Saturday after Evangelinos forced her into Stewart's car.

United States in War, Rome View

ROME, June 18-(P)-The war has been reduced to a struggle between the United States and Great Britain on one side and "a large part of the rest of the world" on the other, an authoritative fascist spokesman declared today.

Fascists contemplated a "second Munich," which, they said, must wipe British influence from continental Europe for all time.

With France in collapse, and Britain fighting with material assistance from the United States, Virginia Gayda, Premier Mussolini's sometime editorial spokesman, said the war had settled into a "purely anglo-saxon struggle against a large part of the rest of the world."

"England remains alone to fight with her imperial forces and with the aid of war material and finance promised by the United States," Gayda wrote.

It remains to be seen how long and in what effective form this war can last."
