Budget Accepted By Scio Voters

\$6071.20 to Be Raised by Taxes for Next School Year

SCIO—Twenty electors at the annual school meeting of district No. 25, Scio, adopted without discussion the budget for the ensuing year as prepared by Mrs. Mylo Bartu, clerk.

Cash on hand at the beginning of the school year June, 1939, was \$288.59, Mrs. Bartu stated. Receipts during the year were \$15,820.13; disbursements totaled \$16,655.15, leaving a cash balance at the meeting Monday of \$285.03.

Taxes soon to be received will cover \$3351.64 in warrants issued and unpaid for want of funds, the clerk stated. Maintenance and operation of the school plant were \$1745.48 during the 1939-40 term, the record showed.

Balance to be raised by district tax for the coming school year will be \$3071.20, estimated receipts being tabulated at \$6558.50 and estimated expenditures at \$12,660.

The meeting elected Kenneth Purdy, 1923 graduate of Salem high school, as a member of the board to succeed Kenneth McPried term of O. A. Hall and was not a candidate for reelection. J. A. Withers also was nominated for the position.

Mrs. Bartu was chosen for a third term as clerk of the district. Mrs. Glenn Holland was another nominee. The board now includes Mrs. Rolla Shelton, chairman, F. G. Cary and Purdy.
