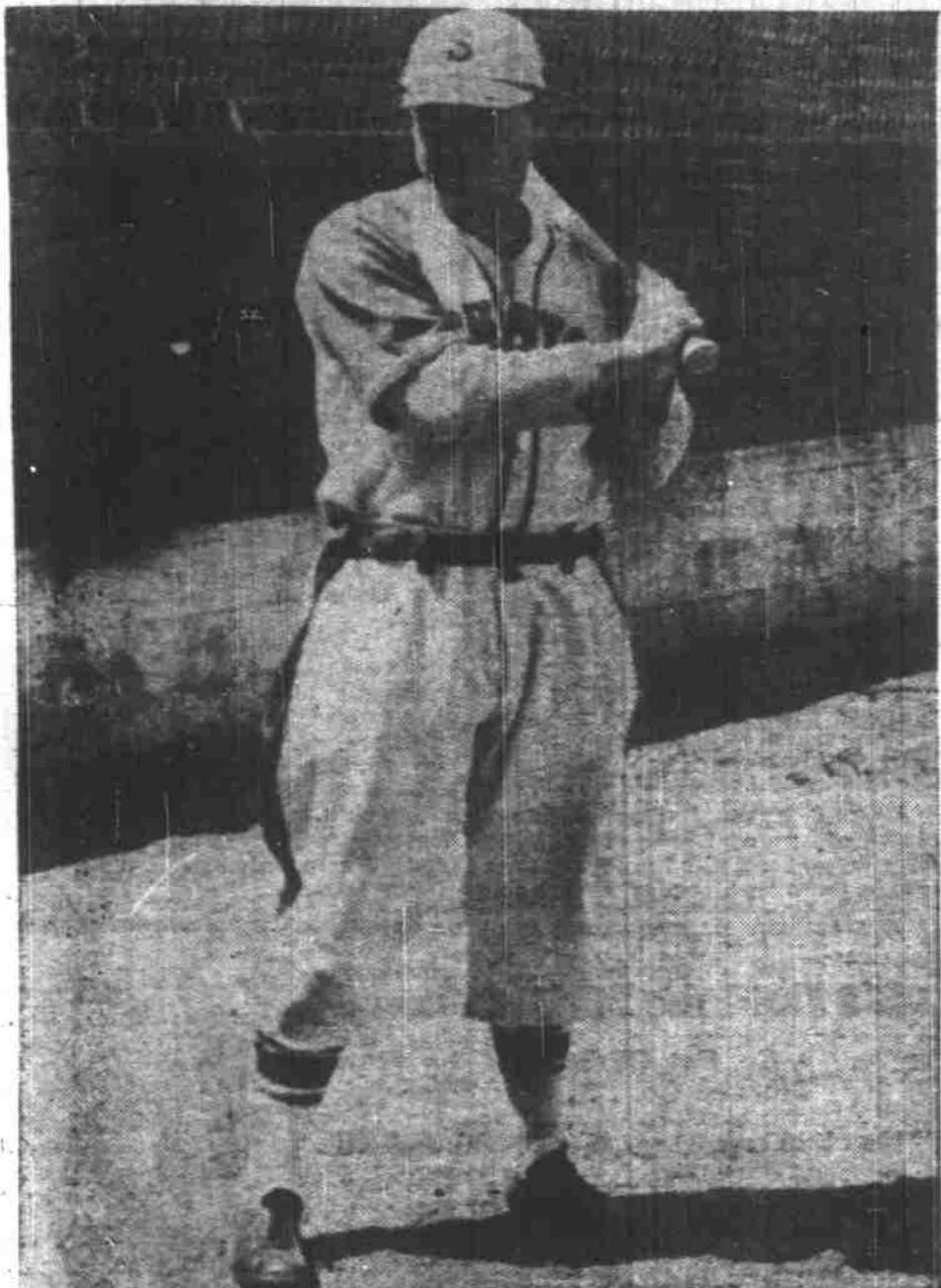


State Meet Practice Draws 150

Chuck Congdon Tops NW Meet

Only One of Five Leaders to Improve Position; 3 Strokes Ahead

SEATTLE, June 20.—(AP)—Long-hitting Chuck Congdon, the Tacoma professional, was the only one of yesterday's five leaders to improve the torrid pace in the Pacific northwest open golf tournament at the Sand Point Country club today, and his 67-68-133 put him three strokes ahead of the field at the halfway mark of the 72-hole event.

Congdon lashed out with a 32 on his outgoing nine and came in with a 34 which put him seven strokes under the perfect figures on the par 35-36-70 layout.

Three other golfers, including Defending Champion and National Amateur Champion Bud Ward of Spokane who knotted in second place at 136 strokes. Freddie Wood, Vancouver, BC, pro, and Harry Givan, recent British Columbia open winner from Seattle, composed the challenging trio.

On stroke under par at 139 were two professionals, Al Zimmerman of Portland and Ken Tucker of Everett.

The top 25 pros and top 25 amateurs play the journey's final 36 holes tomorrow.

Congdon, state professional and open champion, had nothing worse than par his entire round. His 66, however, was matched by the diminutive Freddie Wood, who lost the playoff to Congdon last year for taking open Albany.

Wood had an identical 32-34. Givan, one of the five leaders yesterday, was out in 36 and back in 33 today while Ward reversed the figures.

Oregon Angling Prospects Are Dim For Weekend; Warm Weather Hurts

PORTLAND, June 20.—(AP)—Warm weather has cut Oregon angling everywhere except in the Cascade lakes, the state game department's weekly bulletin said today.

Conditions by counties included: Marion—Streams—only fair. North Santiam improved for bait fishing. Perch and crappie angling good on Willamette and sloughs. Lake fishing fair.

Lane—Fair catches reported from upper Willamette and McKenzie rivers. Lakes in eastern sections yielding some good fish but angling generally poor.

Tillamook—Trout fishing fair in all streams. Offshore salmon trolling poor.

Lincoln—High winds cutting surf fishing. Streams low and catches poor.

Cook—Angling conditions only fair. Some good catches of catfish reported from Ten-Mile lake. Cook Bay bass fishing poor.

Curry—Rogue river excellent, trout angling fair. Lake fishing also possible.

Umatilla—Angling barely fair. Best catches made on Umatilla river.

Baker—Trout fishing good in Fish lake, fair in East and West Camp creeks and Burnt river.

Douglas—All fishing slow. Jackson—Stream angling only fair, lake fishing poor.

Klamath—Lake fishing fair to good throughout county.
