

Stock Leaders Tilt Downward

Steels, Aircrafts Back Away After Noon; War Blamed

NEW YORK, June 20.—(AP)—The European scene clouded further today and, despite still favorable domestic business prospects, stock market leaders tilted downward.

The list jogged along over a slightly irregular range until after mid-day when steels and aircrafts began to back away. Rails and utilities were resistant throughout and some of these managed to emerge with modest plus signs. Losses of fractions to 3 points, however, predominated at the close.

The Associated Press average of 60 issues was off .3 of a point at 41. Dealings were frequently at a standstill and transfers for the full session totalled 586,200 shares compared with 560,350 the day before.

Present losers were US Steel, Bethlehem, Allied Chemical, Eastman Kodak, Douglas Aircraft, Glenn Martin, United Aircraft, Standard Oil of N. J., Loft, Kenecott and US Rubber.

Up a shade were Public Service of N. American, Water Works, American Power & Light, Chesapeake & Ohio, Westinghouse and Sears Roebuck.

Grain Fluctuates Without Direction

Prices Lifted Fractions by Less Favorable Crop Report

CHICAGO, June 20.—(AP)—A few less favorable crop reports gave the drifting wheat market a little stimulation at one time today, lifting prices fractionally, but quotations were slightly lower most of the session.

With trade activity curbed by uncertainty of conditions in Europe and most dealers confused by conflicting reports from the war zone, prices were allowed to swing through a range of about a cent without any definite direction.

After dipping to 77 1/2 and 78 1/2 respectively, July and September wheat rose to 78 1/2 and 79 1/2, but later lost all the gain and closed at 78 1/2-3/4 and 78 1/2-3/4, with the market as a whole unchanged to 1/2 cent lower compared with yesterday's finish.

From the southwest came reports that the moisture content of new wheat is excessive in some sections and that processors are acquiring old grain due to this and to the slow marketing of the new crop.

Wool in Boston

800 Tons Logans Signed to FSCC

Deliveries Being Made to Paulus, Hunt Canneries

Some 800 tons of loganberries have been offered for sale to the government by growers in the Salem area, County Agent Harry L. Riches said last night. This represents two-thirds of the 1200 tons which the government will take in this area through the federal surplus commodities corporation.

Deliveries, being made to Paulus Brothers and Hunt Brothers Packing companies, were coming in heavy yesterday as warm weather speeded ripening of the crop.

Although the temporary office, opened this week in the chamber of commerce rooms, will remain open through the end of the delivery period set at July 15, growers must file their offers before June 30. FSCC officials are asking that offers be filed as soon as possible.

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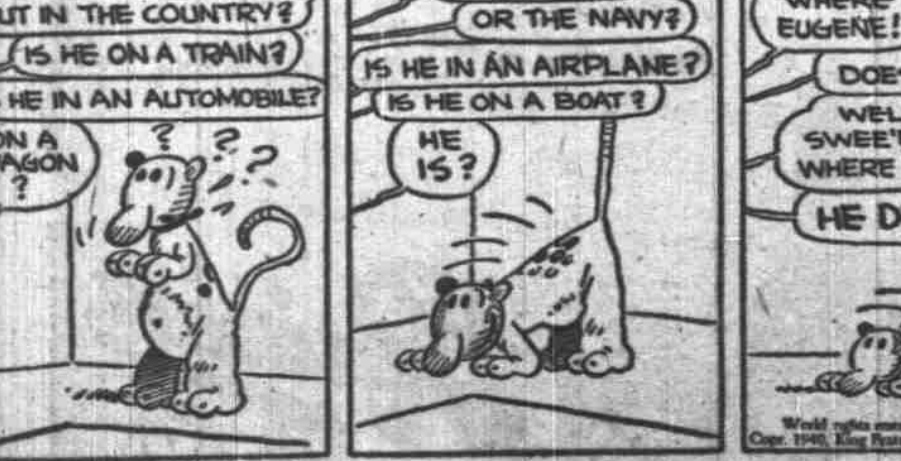
