Airlines Waits Only for Approval by CAA of Valley Stops

All that stands between Salem and main line air service is permission of the civil aeronautics authority to make Willamette valley stops, according to information gleaned by Manager F. D. Thielson of the Salem chamber of commerce at a dinner given chamber and city officials in Portland Wednesday night, he reported yesterday.

Harold Cray, traffic vice president of United Air Lines, Chicago, who spoke at the dinner, said his company was engaging in an expansion program that would include application to the CAA to serve Salem, Eugene and Klamath Falls.

Salem and Eugene, Cray pointed out, are on UAL's present Portland-San Francisco route, operated for 14 years.

Air transportation has expanded until a development of a practical feeder service to towns which have sufficient potential traffic to warrant the service is in order, Cray said, and United is prepared to provide this service. Plans of the company are to operate modern twin-engine equipment to all new cities to be added to its route with CAA approval, tying the new stops into its nationwide network.

The line now has \$9,000,000 worth of new equipment ranging from a new type of twin-engine, 14-passenger, 242-mile-an-hour transport to a 40-passenger, four-engine subsonic plane.

Cray spoke before the Portland chamber in behalf of W. A. Patterson, president of United Air Lines, and presented the chamber with a plaque for distinguished service for commercial aviation.

Isolation Folly Is Hull Belief

Secretary of State Says We Must Beware to Keep Liberty

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 20.—(AP)—Declaring that a "menacing shadow falls blacker and blacker" on this continent, Secretary of State Cordell Hull asserted today at Harvard university, that it was "folly" to believe isolation could preserve American achievements.

"Nation after nation," he pointed out, "has been crushed into surrender, overrun and enslaved by the exercise of brute force combined with fraud and guile."

Naming the oppressor only as "the massed forces of lust for tyrannical power," the secretary asserted that "as the dismal darkness descends upon more and more of the earth's surface, as its menacing shadow falls blacker and blacker athwart our continent, the very instinct of self-preservation bids us beware."

As Hull spoke before an alumni gathering at the university's 289th commencement, conflicting reactions to Europe's war found expression in peace and preparedness meetings; in pamphlets and in the undergraduate press—demanding strict aloofness as well as for active participation in hostilities.

Some 400 of the alumni heard Lewis W. Douglas, former director of the national budget, and William Yessell Elliott, Harvard professor of government, urge compulsory military training, then they adopted a resolution favoring "a system of classes and registration whereby the whole body of citizens shall be available for the services of their country."

Lumber Mill Burns At Hoquiam

HOQUIAM, June 20.—(AP)—Fire burned to the ground the Polson lumber and shingle mill "A" late this afternoon at a loss estimated at \$400,000 to \$500,000.

All Hoquiam fire equipment, aided by trucks from Aberdeen fought the fire which started in the planing mill shortly after 5 p. m. Fanned by 20 mile north-west wind, the flames ate into the lumber yard, where from 15 to 20 million feet of lumber were stored, and soon licked into the plant proper.

Flames were thrown 100 feet into the air and heat from the blaze was intense. Approximately 250 men are employed in the mill.

4th Celebration In Florence to Be Really Old-Time

In the afternoon there will be a 15-event sports program including greased pig and greased pole contests and stunt races. The celebration will close with a free dance that night.

The woman and John H. Stewart, 34, Trinidad, Calif., are held as material witnesses. Woods asserted at a hearing before United States Deputy Commissioner Victor A. Tengwald that Stewart's automobile was used in the case. Miss McGinnis said she formerly worked for Evigenelos.
