The bride's only attendant was Mrs. Allen B. Scott of Seattle, who wore a frock of blue silk net and carried a bouquet of pink flowers.

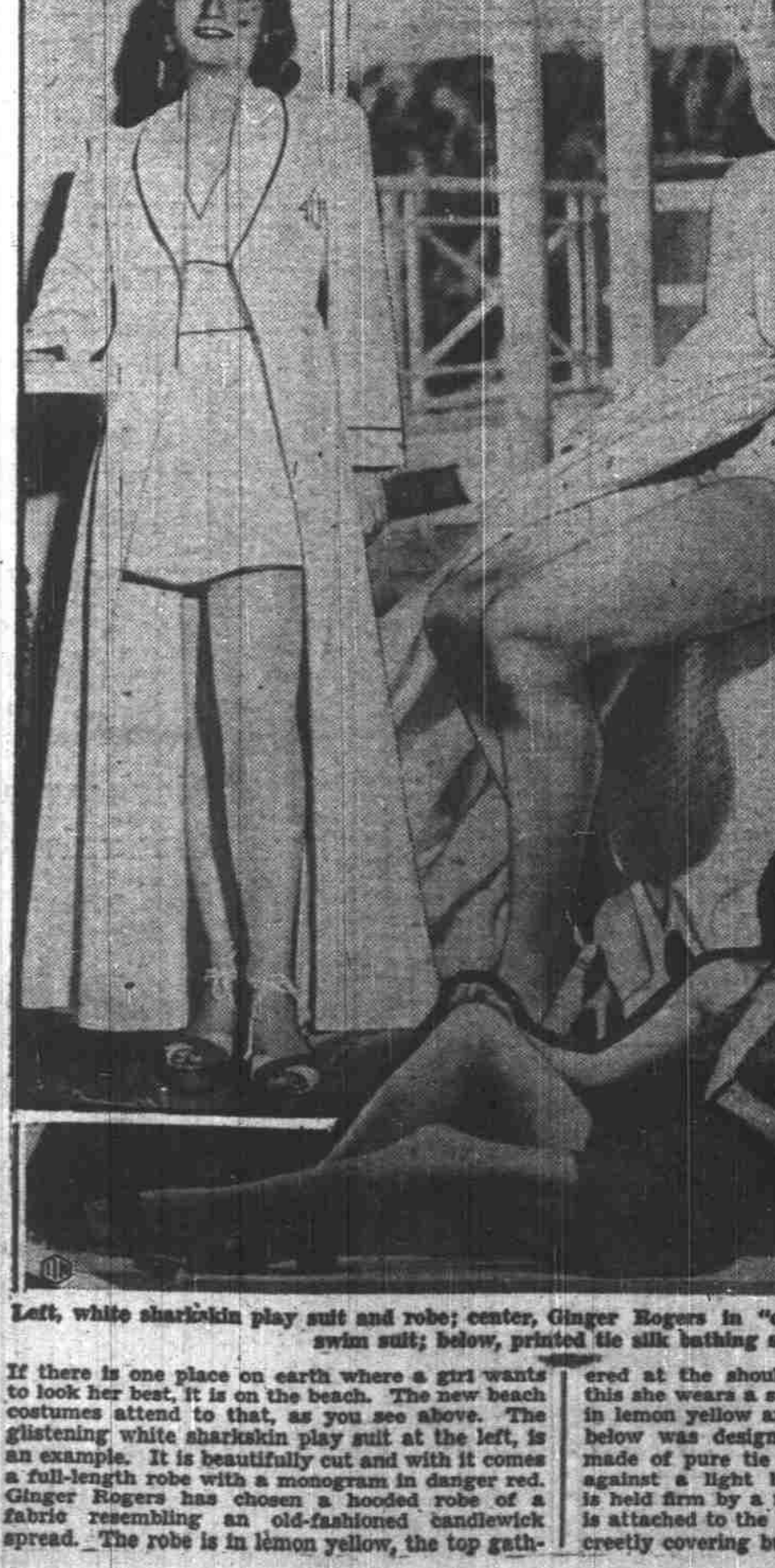

- LILY PONS PUNCH**
1 quart ripe red currants
4 cups water
1 quart red raspberries
Juice of three lemons
1/2 cup sugar
1 pint of chilled ginger ale
Wash, drain, and crush currants and raspberries. Add 1 cup water and cook until currants become white. Strain through cheesecloth and add sugar, lemon juice and remaining three cups water. Mix thoroughly and chill. When ready to serve, combine with ginger ale. Serve in ice-filled glasses. Serves 6-8.
