Over 600 Salmon Leap to Freedom Over New Fish Ladder at Stayton

STAYTON—Over 600 chinook, steelhead and jack salmon leaped from pool to pool in making their way on up the ditch to freedom after the completion of the new fish ladder built next to the Mountain States Power company plant by the Oregon state fish commission.

Over 100 people watched the spectacular sight. It took exactly an hour from the time the water was put into the fish ladder until the first fish was seen going out of the last pool and into the upper ditch back of the Schlies Brothers garage.

Some of the salmon jumped wildly in attempts to get up the river and landed on the ground.

The water will be diverted through the fish ladder from 5 p. m. until morning and at such times as it is deemed necessary to get the salmon up the river to the spawning grounds.
