Estimate Increase In Liquor Revenue

Oregon liquor consumers will contribute approximately a quarter of a million dollars more revenue to the state relief fund during the fiscal year starting July 1, J. N. Chambers, Salem member of the state liquor control commission estimated Thursday.

Chambers said this was continuing upon a continuance of sales, based on those of the past year, at the increased prices.

He said the price increase averaging 15 cents a pint or 20 cents a quart was necessary because of the new federal axes which become operative July 1.

Plane to Be Sold If Buyer Is Found

The Waco cabin biplane, purchased by Ex-estate Forester J. W. Ferguson last summer at a cost of approximately \$12,000 is to be sold in case a buyer is found, forestry department officials announced yesterday.

Job Placement Record Broken

Salem Office Runs Second in Supplementary Classification

All placement records since the establishment of the state employment service five years ago were broken last week when 11,125 persons received jobs through the 21 offices, Director L. C. Stoll announced Thursday.

Of this number 5360 placements were in Multnomah and Washington county berry fields. There were 1293 placements on private industry payrolls. Pendleton led with 226 jobs, mainly in pea canneries, with Eugene second with 195. Portland reported 186 and Albany 167.

Salem, with 1929 placements, ranked second under the supplementary classification. Hood River had 433, Pendleton 411, Eugene 405, Albany 369, Corvallis 239 and Oregon City 181. Astoria, with 56, led in public jobs.

Placements for the first three weeks of June, 1940, have exceeded those for the entire month of June, 1939. So far 24,232 jobs have been recorded for June this year as against 17,305 for the entire month last year.

Stoll said a shortage of farm workers and harvest hands was threatened in several sections of the state. Mill fires have thrown a number of workers out of jobs.

Bridge Building Bill Is Approved

Would Bar Federal Funds' Use on Bridge Near Toll Bridge

Under provisions of a bill recently approved by the United States senate and now up for consideration in the house, bridges could not be constructed with federal funds within 10 miles of an existing toll bridge unless a reasonable offer was made to purchase such bridge and the offer was refused.

Reasonableness of the offer would be determined by the federal works administrator.

A copy of the bill was received at the state highway department office here Thursday.

The bill also provides that the federal works administrator shall give priority of approval on projects recommended by the appropriate defense agency as important to the national defense.

In a section of the bill permitting the use of unmatched funds under certain conditions there was added the provision "or that the constitution of the state provide that all of such proceeds shall be used for highways."

State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock said the bill was satisfactory to Oregon officials.

YM to Operate 2 Camps for Boys

Two camps will be utilized by the Salem YMCA next week to accommodate an exceptionally large group of younger boys registered for the camping period.

Approximately 26 boys, 16 leaders and a camp staff will be in the Silver Creek recreational area, and probably 65 will be at the Smith Creek camp, for which registration is nearly complete.

Fred Smith is director at the larger camp and Bob Smith at the smaller area.

The larger part of the boys, from 9 to 12 years of age, took physical examinations last night.

Deficit Shown in Assistance Fund

Liquor Revenues not Apace With Demands for Relief Pensions

Oregon's public assistance fund will show a deficit of approximately \$650,000 at the end of this year due to failure of liquor revenues to keep pace with the demands for relief pensions, State Treasurer Walter E. Pearson notified Governor Charles A. Sprague Thursday.

The state treasurer estimated that public assistance expenditures for the last six months of 1940 would be \$2,358,000, while revenues would not exceed \$1,708,000.

"It looks as though we'll have to live on borrowed money from now on," Pearson declared.

The 1939 legislature appropriated \$11,209,239 for public assistance for 1939 and 1940, but liquor revenues did not provide enough money to meet the appropriation.

The liquor commission reported recently that it had turned over approximately \$3,260,000 to the state treasurer for old age assistance during the biennium.

Durham Seriously Ill; Has Stroke

Professor H. F. Durham, a teacher in Salem schools for nearly 30 years, is reported seriously ill as the result of a paralytic stroke suffered early this week.

Professor Durham received his training at Warrensburg, Mo., and began teaching at the age of 19 years. He later took work at the University of Oregon and University of Washington and held a life teaching certificate.

After serving as a teacher in the Washington and Richmond schools, he was principal at Washington, Yew Park and Lincoln schools. From 1925 to the year of 1933-34, he was principal at Parrish junior high school.
