

Artist Plays 6 Instruments

Will Give Sacred Concert at Lutheran Churches Sunday, Monday

A sacred concert will be given at the American Lutheran church Sunday night at 7:30 by Orben Sime, Norwegian-American artist who plays six instruments, including the world's only fork cello.

Interpreting the 150th Psalm, "Praise God in His Sanctuary," the artist will sing in English, Scandinavian and German as well as play on his instruments. The concert features the theremin, an instrument played entirely without touch. Besides this and his fork cello, he plays the melodian organ, electric guitar, zither auto-harp and nordic viol.

Members to be played are "Sweet Hour of Prayer," "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God," "O Bleeding Head and Wounded," "Rock of Ages," "Jesus Lover of My Soul," "Silent Night," and "Now Thank We All Our God."

Sime has given over 5000 concerts and has driven over a million miles during concert appearances in the last 19 years. He will appear again Monday night at 8 o'clock at the Christ Lutheran church.

At the morning service at the American Lutheran church, Dr. L. Sawyer of Seattle will speak. His subject will be "Challenge to Men." Dr. Sawyer is president of the Pacific synod of the United Lutheran church of America and pastor of the Central Lutheran church in Seattle.

Wool Business Volume Is Light

BOSTON, June 23.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"The wool market here has been gradually subsiding all the week. Quotations are hardly changed on Summer street, compared with a week ago, but are slightly lower in the far west. The volume of business done both here and in the west has been slight. Some fine and fine medium wools of average to choice type have been sold in New Mexico at prices equivalent to 78-84 cents, clean basis, Boston, off two cents for the week. Most mid-west holders want 40 cents or better delivered mill for medium country-packed wools but 39 cents is the top bid at the moment."

"Civillian piecegoods business is still sluggish and the trace is watching government fabric contracts carefully."

"Offerings of South American lace-over wools and wools which were sold to Europe but cannot now be shipped are being made to this market on a competitive basis. Uruguay has granted an export subsidy on wools to ten per cent. It is rumored that she may increase this subsidy."

"Mohair is slow and hardly changed in price."

37,205 Cattle Tested In Oregon During May

Tests for Bangs disease and tuberculosis in cattle reported to the annual division of the state agricultural department during May totaled 37,205, officials announced here Friday.

Of this number, 22,329 were for Bangs disease. Reactors numbered 247. Eighty-six cattle reacted to the tuberculosis test.

Approximately 325 cattle and 5739 sheep were inspected for scabies.
