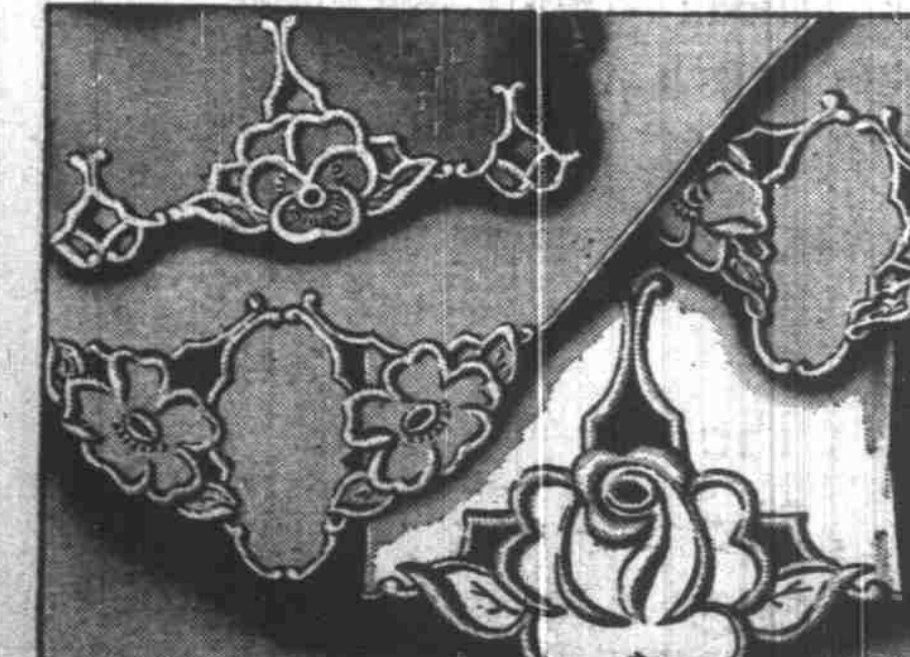
Daughters Unit Organized

Variety in Ice Cream Flavors

Take your favorite recipe for ice cream, and vary it a dozen or two ways to make yourself a popular hostess.

Use brown sugar for sweetening instead of white sugar, the flavor will change, the ivory color will be pleasing to the eye.

Add crushed almond rocha (the kind you buy at the confectionery) to make an interesting looking and highly pleasing variation to the vanilla ice cream.

Crushed peppermint candy is equally simple to add and gives good color and flavor.

Shave some bitter-sweet chocolate rather coarsely into the ice cream when you are stirring it up for the last time, before it's completed the freezing process. The shaved chocolate remains

partially in pieces and tastes as good as it looks.

Add well drained maraschino cherries or nuts—or both—to the ice cream.

Fold in some finely chopped candied ginger.

You can make a very fine dessert, use up leftover cookies, or even stale cookie or cake crumbs and add bulk to your vanilla ice cream by folding a generous quantity of the crumbs into the frozen mixture.

A simple and mighty good way to use up fruit such as canned peaches. Is to crush them, drain and fold into the vanilla ice cream recipe.
