

Cunningham Loses as New Record Set

Vault and 1500 Marks Lopped

Warmerdam Tops His Old 15-Foot Record at Fresno Meet

FRESNO, Calif., June 29.—(AP)—Cornelius Warmerdam, Tuolumne, Calif., school teacher, bettered his own unofficial world's pole vault record tonight with a vault of 15 feet, 1 1/2 inches. Earlier this year at Berkeley, Calif., he cleared an even 15 feet, now up for official approval.

FRESNO, Calif., June 29.—(AP)—Veteran Glen Cunningham, making his final appearance of a long and brilliant foot racing career, failed to achieve an ambition tonight but in losing to Walter Mehl in the 1500-meter run of the national AAU track and field championships, he forced the latter to a new American record.

Mehl, overtaking the 31-year-old Cunningham in the last 35 yards, broke the tape in three minutes, 47.9 seconds. It was only one-tenth of a second slower than the world's record set in the 1938 Olympic games by Jack Lovelock of New Zealand.

The old American and senior AAU records were 3:48.8 made in 1934 by Bill Bonthron of Princeton university. Cunningham, winding up many years of competition, set the pace until the finish line loomed. He had shaken off two bids for the lead by Paul Moore of Stanford but as the latter fell back, Mehl put on a sprint that carried him past Cunningham and on to a great victory.

Too Much Kick

The former University of Wisconsin star had too much of a finishing kick for Cunningham. The rugged Kansan had hoped to complete his career by winning the AAU "metric mile" for the sixth time. The distance is 1640 yards, 1 foot and 3 inches. John Munksi of Columbia, Mo., ran fourth and Gene Venzke of the New York AA was fifth. Andrew Neidig of the Millrose AA, New York, took sixth, while Blaine Rideout, former North Texas State Teachers star and defending AAU champion, was seventh, out of the point scoring. Rideout now competes for the Shore Athletic club of New Jersey.

Wild William Harris Still Atop WI Batting Averages; Our Solons Improve Team Fielding Position

Though dropping 10 points in official Western International league averages as of June 25, Wild William Harris of our Senators led loop hitters for the third straight week. His .379 average upon that date was 12 points less than teammate Eddie Wilson's, but Wilson had not played in enough games to take the honor away from Wild Williams.

Bill Brenner, Tacoma catcher, held second place with a .361, followed by Big Smead Jolley of Spokane, .352. Jolley boomed his runs batted in to 87 in 64 games and led the league in total hits, total bases, two base hits and home runs.

Tacoma's Ray Medeghini took over the pitching lead with five wins to one loss, followed by Spokane's George "The Duke" Windsor with nine and two.

Contrary to supposition, Salem moved to the top of the circuit in team fielding but skidded one place, to fourth, in team batting. The averages as of June 25, released by the Howe News Bureau, league statisticians:

fashion that has marked all of his appearances this season. Harold Davis of Salinas (Calif.) Junior college won the 100-meter final in 16.3 seconds, defeating among others the 1940 national collegiate AAU champion, Norwood Ewell, of Penn State college.

Davis' winning time was one-tenth of a second slower than the world's record set in 1936 by Jesse Owens.

Al Blozis, Georgetown university, won the shotput with a heave of 55 feet 3/4 inch. He set a new American record of 56 feet 3/4 inch in the NCAA championship at Minneapolis two weeks ago.

Squaring matters for his defeat in the NCAA meet, Fred Wolcott of Rice institute outran Ed Dugger, Tufts negro, to win the 110 meters hurdles. His time of 13.9 seconds bettered the list-American record of 14.1 made in 1936 by Forrest Towns.

Wolcott headed Dugger by nearly two yards after going to the front at the half-way mark. In their previous meeting Dugger edged out the long-legged southerner in a 13.9 race.

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Whitman College Names New Coach

Richard Ainslie, Purdue, Named PE Instructor to Aid Borleske

WHITMAN COLLEGE, Walla Walla, Wash., June 29.—(Special)—President Walter A. Bratton of Whitman college today announced the appointment of Richard G. Ainslie of West Lafayette, Indiana, as instructor in physical education, intramural director and assistant coach for next year.

Ainslie will take the place of Bill Loenneke, who resigned after completion of the past school year. Loenneke had been here two years.

The new mentor, who will probably take on a large share of the varsity coaching duties since Head Coach R. V. "Nig" Borleske is expected to be out of town a good deal in his new capacity as district governor of Rotary International, is a graduate of Purdue university, where he was a three-year letterman in football and baseball.

During the past year Ainslie served as backfield coach and freshman basketball coach at Purdue, at the same time completing requirements for his master's degree, which he received this month.

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
