Columbia Area Stubborn Fire Being Checked

Breeze From Sea Brings Hope of Rain; Down Timber Is Lost Sawmill Burns; Fires in Washington Outlook Changes Rapidly

(By The Associated Press) A salty ocean breeze blew in from the coast Tuesday night and weary forest fire fighters of western Oregon hoped it was a forerunner of rain.

The fiercest and hottest June of recent years left the forests dry and the blazing columns lost little time in weaving a path of destruction. The blaze that fanned out Monday night from the Sunset Logging company's operations in Columbia county was being slowly checked.

Anti-Semitic Riots Rage in Rumania; West Front Active

Carol already is blamed by some Rumanian factions for ceding back to Russia the rich territories of Bessarabia and northern Bucovina.

Control Exports Of War Material

FDR Order Lists Machine Tools but not Scrap Iron for Present

WASHINGTON, July 2.—(AP)—President Roosevelt established strict control over the export of numerous vital war materials today to guard against a shortage in this country. Immediately after signing a bill which gave him authority to do so, he issued a proclamation banning the export after July 5, except upon specific license, of rubber, silk, wool, hides, aluminum, asbestos and other materials, metals; and certain chemicals, aircraft parts and machine tools.

Dutch Commander Is Made Prisoner

AMSTERDAM, July 2.—(Wednesday)—(P)—Gen. H. G. Winkelman, The Netherlands commander in chief, has been transported to Germany as a year prisoner, it was announced officially today.

Reargument Upon Picket Law Asked

Means no Decision Until Fall; All Justices Will Hear Case

Status of Oregon's anti-picketing law will continue unsettled until next fall. The state supreme court announced yesterday that it had ordered the test case on the act reargued next September. All seven members will be on the bench for the rehearing. Associate Justice J. O. Bailey was in the east and Associate Justice Henry J. Bean was ill when the first hearing was held a few weeks ago.
