Flames Near Timber and Glenwood; Sawmill Burns, Carlton

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fire started in the town by an ember was controlled.

The L. H. L. Lumber company mill and plant at Carlton were destroyed in the night by a blaze starting in the boiler room. Loss was estimated by the owners at \$40,000.

A spark from the burning mill also destroyed a barn two blocks away. Fire equipment from Carlton, McMinnville and Yamhill prevented further losses.

In Washington state, the worst fire continued to be the fiercely burning camp McDonald blaze in Lewis county. It already has covered 10,000 acres.

May C. S. Governor of the Washington Forest Fire association reported from Chehalis that 1,000 fire fighters are driving long fire trails south and west of the burn.

State forestry supervisor T. S. Goodyear said that western Washington's second largest fire, a 4,000 acre blaze between Vail, Thurston county, and Alpha, Lewis county, was still burning, but under control.

No new major blazes were reported, but Washington officials emphasized that the situation still was extremely dangerous. Many brush fires kept local agencies busy today, but they were soon controlled.

GLACIER PARK, Mont., July 4.—Four hundred men were hurrying tonight to Nyack, on the western edge of Glacier national park, to join 200 fighting a forest fire.

Estimates of the burned area, four miles north of Nyack, ranged up to 10,000 acres.

The park superintendent, D. S. Libbey, said rain fell at Nyack late today and additional showers might check the flames.

Fire control specialists, including men skilled in overhead fire fighting, were en route to the park from California, Oregon and Yellowstone national park.

The employers won the right to choose "key" employees from union lists rather than accept them on rotation principle, and obtained the union's consent not to press jurisdictional claims over nurses, bonded employees and like workers.

The union won a 10 per cent wage adjustment and time off on weekends in New York, Baltimore, New Orleans, San Francisco and Honolulu, except on arrival and departure days. Certain groups of union members also were awarded an eight-hour day instead of nine hours, in a spread of 13 hours on passenger ships.

Nahant police said three secret service agents had been on duty for the past three weeks, guarding the ocean front estate on eight hour shifts through the day and night.

The young Roosevelts had made no request to them for special protection, local police said, adding they were unable to explain the agents' presence. Mrs. Roosevelt is the former Anne Clark of Boston.

Only One Ship Escapes Coup

Most French Navy Units Surrender, Some in Scottish Ports

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given permission by Adolf Hitler to scuttle its remaining warships or take any other steps necessary to keep them from British hands. The "surrender government" of France took umbrage.

The Italian news agency Stefani reported that the French ordered attacks on any British ships or planes coming within the 12-mile coastal limits of continental or colonial France.

The German radio declared the French foreign minister had informed William C. Bullitt, US ambassador, that the British assault is "counter to international law."

The radio account said Bullitt was asked to convey to President Roosevelt the strong protest of Premier Petain's government. The German radio also declared that Marshal Petain would make a statement in reply to Churchill and would issue a manifesto defining the future attitude of France towards Great Britain.

Despite the reported indignant attitude of the French government, French leaders who are still allied with the British government in England were jubilant over the history-making thrusts by the royal navy.

While the German-French-British triangle took world attention, Rumania placed her destiny in Germany's hands with formation of a new pro-German, anti-semitic, nationalistic government. The step was taken after unconfirmed reports of new Russian demands upon Rumania were heard.

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words, "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights: that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

"Then came the blight of totalitarianism and even here, on this day of rejoicing for our nation, we feel sorrowful because of the tragedy that has stricken Europe. We can imagine these tragedies," he added, "even though most of them are hidden behind the curtain of censorship."

In stating his beliefs on national defense, Howard said that unity has come to this country because of events abroad. He said that the American Legion must be gratified that the United States is "at last" arming for the "adequate" national defense which the Legion has worked for during past years.

Three cardinal points in defense of the western hemisphere as stressed by the college president were: "the physical aspect—arms and tools of war," weeding out of subversive activities and setting aside of "diversive" activities.

"Actions which destroy the national unity at such a time as this should be regarded with the same feeling as activities aimed at destroying the very foundations of our government," the educator said. "We should keep our expressions of difference within reasonable bounds," he added.

Howard also said that the leaders of various groups with oppos-

ing beliefs are showing the nation the way to this national unity by setting aside their "petty" difficulties in the face of the greater need. Common interests should outweigh all differences, he added.

Ending his address, the educator quoted the last stanza of "America," saying, "It should remain in the hearts of citizens of the United States as an ideal to aim for."

Barkley A. Newman, general chairman of the celebration, outlined the day's activities following Howard's speech.
