Canada Bans 117 US Publications

OTTAWA, July 4.—(Canadian Press)—The entry of 117 United States periodicals into Canada has been banned since the start of the war and 10 others are in process of being excluded, a government spokesman said today in the house of commons in answer to a question from T. L. Church, Toronto conservative.

Church asked specifically about the Chicago Tribune and the Saturday Evening Post. He said they carried articles detrimental to the prosecution of the war.

The spokesman replied that press censors had not recommended the exclusion of the publications because they "were not satisfied that the nature and quantity of such subversive material as these publications might have contained warranted exclusion from this country in the light of other considerations which were involved in such drastic action."

"The recent policy of both the Chicago Tribune and the Saturday Evening Post," the spokesman added, "has been more favorable to the British cause but every issue of these publications is being carefully examined and the policy adopted is based on current contents."

Mrs. Cromwell Is To Aid Refugees

HONOLULU, July 4.—(AP)—Mrs. James H. R. Cromwell's secretary said today that a reported offer by Mrs. Cromwell to support a number of English refugee children was in line with her policies of aiding children and would in no way interfere or limit her program of help to American children.

Medical Group Formed Here

Association Aims Medical and Surgical Service for Low Incomes

Organization of the Salem Medical Benefits society, a voluntary, non-profit association, by a group of public-spirited citizens was announced here this week. The society is formed under the state corporation laws.

Aim of the society is to bring within reach of the ordinary income and wage earner and his family a high class of medical and surgical service. Payment is made on a monthly basis, as in the case of the Oregon Hospital Service society organized early last year.

The society issued the following statement concerning its expected mode of operation:

"The Salem Medical Benefits society makes it possible for doctors of medicine to provide their services directly to the members. No third party comes between the doctor and his patient."

"The Salem Medical Benefits society is, so far as we know, the only plan in the state offering to the entire family medical and surgical services that have the approval of the medical society, the hospital and the patient."

"The society is administered by a group of public-spirited citizens composed of doctors and laymen, who serve without compensation of any kind. No commissions or bonuses are paid and every effort is put forth to definitely keep down expenses."

"The Salem Medical Benefits society in cooperation with the Oregon Hospital Service society now enables you, through small monthly payments, to protect yourself and family against hospital and medical expenses."

"The Oregon Hospital Service society has now been in operation more than a year and has paid over \$1300 of its members' hospital bills, and has set aside a reserve for future emergencies."

"Both plans have been proven reliable and a sure way to budget the unpredictable injury and illness costs."

"We will begin to accept applications in groups on July 5, 1940. We must ask that groups be formed, so as to secure an average cross section of the people. This has proved very necessary to keep down the average costs of coverage."

The new society's office is located in room 122, new Bligh building.

Army Air Corps Taking Recruits

The regular army air corps is accepting recruits for the first time in several months, with those enlisted being sent to west coast training centers at Moffett field and Stockton, Calif., for preliminary training before assignment to an air corps unit.

Minimum educational requirement for air corps is high school education or its equivalent, or journeyman's rating in a mechanical trade.

John J. Uselman, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Uselman of route four, Salem, is the latest army recruit from the Salem station. He enlisted for the 6th coast artillery, Fort Winfield Scott, Calif. Twelve enlistments were made in June through the Salem station, where Sergeant Joseph Scarpa is in charge.

Wife of Nevada Bishop Dies, 69

MONTEREY, Calif., July 4.—(AP)—Mrs. Ruth Mary Jenkins, 69, wife of the Right Reverend Thomas Jenkins, bishop of the Episcopal diocese of Nevada, died last night at nearby Pacific Grove.

Mrs. Jenkins had resided in Reno 12 years, previously being at McMinville, Ore., where the bishop was an Episcopal pastor.

Survivors include seven children, two sisters and a brother.

Cascade Locks Is Lauded by Pierce

House Is Told of Publicly Owned Power Plant and Water System

WASHINGTON, July 4.—(AP)—Cascade Locks, Ore., made a "courageous" court fight before it was able to take over its own electric system, Rep. Pierce (D-Ore.) told the house in recounting the history of the city's publicly owned electric utility.

"The community of Cascade Locks is certainly to be congratulated on its sound financial set-up, on the judgment exercised throughout its negotiations for acquiring the utility, on its patience through the legal struggle and certainly upon the results accomplished in such a short period," Pierce said.

"I am proud such an enterprising community is in the second Oregon district, which I represent."

The public power plant, Pierce declared, saved the community \$7000 in one year's residential rates and has earned a substantial sum toward community investment which will "pay dividends for all time." In 20 years, he added, the city will own a debt-free electric distribution system.

The city, he said, also owns its water system. It was the first Oregon town to sign a contract for Bonneville dam power to supplement its own supply.

Railroads Speed Freight Schedule

CHICAGO, July 4.—(AP)—A majority of western railroads will initiate on Friday an eastbound perishable freight schedule making possible a 24-hour reduction in trips between the Pacific coast and New York sales centers.

Shipments leaving concentration points in California and the north Pacific area will arrive in St. Louis at 12:30 p. m. (CST) on the sixth day, a reduction of 12 hours from existing schedules. They will arrive in Chicago at 4:30 p. m. (CST), a reduction of eight hours.

If prompt connections with eastern lines can be made at Chicago and St. Louis, the freight will reach the east 24 hours earlier than under present schedules for the transcontinental run.

The first shipments to leave the west under the new program will reach Chicago and St. Louis July 11.

Drivers' School Set at Silverton

Internal Strength Urged by Sprague

Speech at Baker Holds Peace Attitude Has Caused "Rusting"

BAKER, July 4.—(AP)—Governor Sprague urged the people's support of democracy today after warning that "age & no guarantee of perpetuity."

"We need not only military strength," he told the Baker County Pioneers' association, "but need to strengthen our internal defenses."

The United States has been peace-minded since the World War, he added, with the result it has let its "spirit rust" along with its military machine.

Military developments of the past year have shown that the Atlantic and Pacific oceans are not adequate defenses, the governor declared.

He was accompanied in an army observation plane by Lieut. Col. George Dutton, military aide; Cecil Edwards, his secretary; Captain Claude Owen and two other officers of the 41st army division.

The Baker national guard was inspected at the airport. Mrs. Angeline McCord, Baker county's oldest woman, was crowned queen of the association by her great granddaughter, Shirley McCord.

Ship Headed for Russia Slips out

TACOMA, July 4.—(AP)—The Johnson line motorship Ecuador bound for Vladivostok, Russia, slipped out of Tacoma harbor at 5 p. m. today, approximately 48 hours before she was tentatively scheduled to sail.

Waterfront observers were at a loss to explain the Ecuador's sudden departure, which they said must have resulted in failure to load all of the cargo intended for the vessel.

The ship had been in Tacoma harbor for several weeks, part of the time in unexplained idleness. She finally began loading after it was reported United States navy officials had approved shipment of major portion of 133 carsloads of machinery brought here from the east. The navy was said to have recommended that about one-third of the shipment be withheld on the grounds it was needed in the nation's defense program.

hemisphere, this government's agents have encountered the possibility that the United States, instead of "the good neighbor," might become "the good thing."

The tendency has caused the negotiations to be conducted with the utmost care, but high hopes are held on all sides that the final decisions will be strong, fair and effective.

There is no question but what Wendell Wilkie's clean politics program spurred the house leaders into more favorable consideration and probably ultimate passage of the Hatch bill. Speaker Bankhead who rules the house has been signing the bill. Floor Leader, Rayburn's interest in it had been unenthusiastic until this week. Many fair-minded democratic politicians in the house thought the mere banning of state employee receiving salaries from the federal government, might prove to be an unjustifiable restraint on political campaign contributions.

Wilkie's decision to go much further than the old Hatch law or the new bill put them in a tight position, and they had to act.

Old republican finance raisers say the Wilkie restriction against corporate contributions, his \$5,000 limitation, and a ban on cash gifts of more than \$10 will seriously impair their ability to raise money.

Wholly new methods of raising small contributions without overhead expense must be devised if the campaign is not to suffer.

County Aid List Drops 38 in Year

Marion county's general assistance caseload dropped to 507 last month, according to M. E. Holcomb, welfare administrator. The load in June, 1939, was 545.

The current number of cases includes many persons who would be on the old age assistance rolls if applications for this type of aid could be accepted.

Last month's 507 general assistance cases included 1,257 persons of which 1961 were members of 281 welfare families and 226 were single persons.

The bill for general assistance for the month was \$9382.15. It included \$2637 in cash grants, \$4192.53 in regulation relief, \$201.40 for burials, \$1343.55 for burials and \$901.61 for other medical care.

NYA Allotment Raised, Oregon

PORTLAND, July 4.—(AP)—Ivan G. Moore, NYA state administrator, said today Oregon had been allotted \$482,984 for the new fiscal year's out of school work program.

The appropriation, a 15 per cent increase, will be extended to about 2500 boys and girls. No word has been received about the high school and college work programs.

Bride Will Continue Ice Career, Perhaps not Movies, Hinted

CHICAGO, July 4.—(AP)—Sonja Henie, blonde star of the screen and skating rink, was married today to Dan Topping, wealthy New York sportsman.

The ceremony was performed in the Lake Shore drive apartment of Arthur H. White, an official of the Chicago stadium, by the Rev. Dr. Joshua Oden, pastor of the Irving Park Lutheran church. Only a few friends of the couple and relatives of Miss Henie were present.

While their names had been linked romantically for more than six months, they became engaged in New York just a week ago and came to Chicago last night. Miss Henie wept gently during the ceremony. Her "I do's" were barely audible.

The bride and groom stood uncertainly for a moment after the nuptials were completed. "Well, she's yours," prompted the clergyman.

Third son of him Topping then gave his pretty wife a kiss. Miss Henie composed herself quickly and the couple laughed and chatted as they posed for photographers.

It was the third marriage for Topping, former husband of Arline Judge, motion picture actress. Topping, 38, who inherited a fortune made in the tin plate industry, is owner of the Brooklyn team of the National professional football league.

sell the place I had bought for mother, pay up the indebtedness, and take the family to Goose Lake. I shaped my arrangements accordingly, and by the first of June, 1869, found myself, with pony, pair of blankets and \$11.50 in money, on my way. One of my mother's brothers, and one of her brothers-in-law, a Mr. John Garrett, started with me; the former for the object that impelled me forward, and the latter for his health.

"We had traveled but a short distance when we began to meet parties on their return from the new country. All seemed to be dissatisfied and did not hesitate to discourage us as much as they could. We continued to meet these discouraging reports until we arrived at Jacksonville, where my mother had spent the winter of 1852-3, and where my father was buried. 'The spirit is strong but the flesh is weak,' but here they both said to be weak, for I had intended to visit the home of my father, but I could not do it. I could not bear the thought. I turned away, for I did not wish to stay in the place where my mother had seen so much trouble.

"By this time the reports had come so thick and fast and Mr. Garrett's health had become no better, so that my two companions concluded to turn back, and I was left to journey on, a stranger in a strange land, with five dollars and ten cents only, and no experience in the cold, strange world. Here I shall not stop to detail, but say that I soon made my way to Yreka, California, probably about 100 miles from Goose Lake valley."
