Sheep Are Used As Hop Strippers At Independence

INDEPENDENCE—A band of sheep belonging to J. J. Graves are being employed in local hop fields stripping hops. The sheep are at the present time in the Frank Kennedy yard south of Independence. The work of stripping hops not only takes considerable time but in taking off the lower leaves from the vines considerable damage is done to the stalk. Graves contends that the sheep take off all the lower leaves without causing any damage. The only disadvantage of the sheep is in yards where new vines have been set to replace missing hills and are not high enough to keep the sheep from reaching the top of the vines.

Dallas Schedules Driving Course

SEVEN WEEKS' INSTRUCTION CONDUCTED BY SNELL TO START MONDAY

DALLAS—A complete course in learning to drive an automobile will be given residents of Dallas who desire it starting on Monday, July 8. It will last for a period of seven weeks. The school is conducted by Earl Snell, secretary of state, as a part of a state-wide safety program.

Anyone 15 years of age or older may enroll in the school. Each one enrolling must furnish his own car and must have arrangements for it to be driven to and from the school by a licensed driver.

The first meeting will be held in the chamber of commerce rooms in the new city hall on Monday at 7 p.m. At this meeting an instructor from the secretary of state's office will outline the course in driving to be offered in the school.

In addition to teaching the mechanical phases of driving the students will be taught the observance of safe driving habits. Observance of rules and regulations of driving pertaining to the operation of automobiles in this state will be stressed throughout the course.

Those who have never driven an automobile or those wishing to improve their driving practices are invited to enroll in the school.

Hop Kilns Are Being Built

Additions at Hanna Ranch Include 100 Cabins, Four Driers

INDEPENDENCE—Work has started on the construction of four hop kilns at the Hanna hop ranch owned by Dean Walker, one mile north of Independence. In addition to the four kilns each 32 by 32, a cooling and balling room 64 by 48 is being constructed. One hundred cabins to be used to house hop pickers are also being constructed on the camp site near the new hop houses.

The new hop driers will be equipped with electric ballers and electric fans in each kiln. The capacity of the new driers will be 1200 to 1400 boxes per day, which is several times more than the old hop driers without the modern equipment.

The Hanna hop ranch is one of several yards owned or operated by Walker. In addition to the 100 acres of hops from this ranch the new driers will take care of the drying of hops from nearby yards owned by Walker.

The new hop drier on the A. J. Haemer & Sons hop ranch, six miles southeast of Independence is also nearing completion. The drier has two kilns each 30 by 30 and a cooling and balling room 40 by 60. It will be equipped with electric fans and an electric baller and will have capacity for approximately 1000 boxes a day.

Haemer estimates that he will have 700 bales of hops from his 200 acres this year. This will be 200 bales more than his average crop of about 500 bales. His latest crop was in 1933 at which time the heavy yield was caused by the overflowing of the Willamette river in the spring. His yield that year was 852 bales.

Not only is Haemer well pleased with the prospects of a good crop this year, but he has one of the best contracts for their sale. He has contracted to sell 50,000 pounds, or less than half of his estimated crop, at 55 cents per pound.

Street Project Will Start Soon

INDEPENDENCE—At the city council Tuesday Councilman R. A. Sylvester, chairman of the street and sewer committee, reported that he had received a report that the WPA were ready to go to work on the street improvement program and that this work would begin shortly. He also reported that the county oiling crew would be here this coming week to oil streets. Property owners may petition the city council for the oiling of streets by this crew. The cost to them will be approximately 10 cents per foot.

The treasurer's report was read by W. A. Barnum and showed a balance cash on hand July 1 of \$6603.99. The only outstanding obligation of the city is a \$500 library bond.

All councilmen present expressed themselves as in favor of retaining John W. Cunningham for a preliminary survey for the sewer improvement work and the street and sewer committee were instructed to contact him to make the arrangements.

Stayton Street Bonds Are Sold

\$13,000 for Oiling Work Involved; Portland Firm Gets Job

STAYTON—The Stayton city council sold the street oiling bonds in the amount of \$13,000. They awarded the high bid of \$101.04 per \$100 of bonds to bear interest at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent per annum. There were several bids and the bidding was very close.

The bonds will be issued as of July 15 to run for 13 years, and be redeemed serially at the rate of \$1000 per year, commencing in 1941.

P. O. Dall and Warren Bros., Inc., of Portland made the low bid of \$4674.00 for approximately 31,000 square yards of oiling work. The preparation of the street base and the furnishing of all the gravel is being done by the town and is not included in this figure.

It is expected that the most highly traveled streets will be improved. The pavement will be 20 feet in width but any individual may have an additional width by paying for the same at the regular cost price.

The council decided to close Water and Second streets during the Santiam Bean festival to be held in town July 15 to 20. This space will be used by the Brownlee Amusement company. They also allowed the use of vacant city property for the entertainment.

The council provided alternate use for irrigation purposes, the residents having odd house numbers to be permitted to irrigate on odd numbered days, and those with even house numbers to irrigate on even numbered days. This is for the purpose of maintaining equal water pressure in town.

The Reynolds ranch is owned by R. M. Walker and C. W. Henkle and operated by Ben Griffith. A high wind made the flames hard to control, it being finally controlled by plowing around ahead of the flames. The loss was partly covered by insurance.
