Two Army Units To Stop in Salem

Another large US army unit, the 63rd coast artillery from Fort MacArthur, Calif., will pass through Salem during the city's Centennial celebration, according to word received by the chamber of commerce yesterday. This unit, believed to consist principally of anti-aircraft equipment and operators, will consist of 1200 men and 250 motor vehicles. It will stop here at or near 4 p. m., August 1.

A section of the 30th infantry, also from California, will stop in Salem July 1 for the night and another section the night of August 7.

The Fort MacArthur contingent has asked the chamber here to supply it with a list of bakeries, dairies and produce firms from which purchases of food may be made here.

Efforts are being made to have one or more of the visiting army units participate in the Centennial parades which will be held July 34, August 1, 2, and 3.

Tax Decree Is Signed Friday

300 Parcels of Land Listed in Big County Action; Redemption Possible

Judgment and foreclosure decree was signed yesterday in the Marion county tax foreclosure case by Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon.

The decree affected nearly 300 parcels of land on which taxes are delinquent for the period prior to June 15. Redemption period allowed after the foreclosure decree is one year.

Considerably more than the 30 days required by law was allowed to elapse before the publication of the foreclosure list in April and early May and the order of default and judgment decrees entered yesterday. It was pointed out.

Since the filing of the original list, a number of parcels of land have been redeemed by payment of back taxes and publication expense, but the bulk of the list remains unchanged.

Governor Charles A. Sprague, elaborating on a statement released here Wednesday night in which he denied there was any "deal" whereby he might succeed Senator Charles L. McNary, declared Friday "he didn't mind if newspaper reporters speculate."

"They can speculate all they want to, but the truth is that I am not even thinking about it. I would appoint as senator in case McNary is elected vice-president at the November election," Governor Sprague said.

Sprague declared that while he was optimistic about McNary's chances of election plenty of time was available to think about his successor.

"Public sentiment favors a political party of this sort and I have no intention of running as governor," his recent statement read.

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Oregon Deaths Ten on Holiday

Auto Crashes Take Four Lives, Drowning and Fire Three Each

(By The Associated Press)
Oregon's July 4 holiday cost 10 lives and many injuries in automobile, fire and drowning tragedies. Four individuals died in traffic accidents, three in a fire and three by drowning.

A blasting tent-house at Gardiner fatally burned Mrs. Albert Johns and her two sons, Bobby, 1, and Jimmy, 2, early Thursday. Johns also was badly burned in the fire which was started by a campfire spark while the family slept.

George Duval, Eugene, and Francis Briggs, Waller, drowned in Waldo lake, high in the Willamette Cascades. Their metal fishing boat sank in 50 feet of water. The bodies were recovered today after Glen Phillips, of Lowell, reported his companions missing.

Elvira McCalvey, 75, Grants Pass, was killed and six other persons were injured in a collision on the Redwood highway south of Grants Pass.

A car plunged from the Dales-Columbia highway nine miles south of Maupin, killing Mrs. M. W. Evans, about 26, and her husband and 11-year-old son. A fourth passenger was slightly hurt.

Jim Kennedy, about 65, Deer Island, was killed in a head-on crash on the lower Columbia river highway. Four persons were slightly injured.

Lillie Mae Jones, 16, of South Deer Creek in Douglas county, was swept away by the current and drowned in the South Umpqua river Thursday. She stepped into a hole while wading. A small brother and sister witnessed the tragedy.

A car crashed into a ditch near Brownsville on the Halsey-Sweet Home highway, killing Jerome L. Lund, 29, of Minneapolis, and critically injuring his companion, Donald Fulk, 22, Albany. Lund came to Albany three months ago from Puyallup, Wash.

Lund died Thursday, just one day before confirmation of his appointment to the United States department of agriculture marketing service arrived.

The son of a Minneapolis Lutheran minister, Lund had worked with the department of agriculture in Minneapolis for eight years and had applied six weeks ago for the job of marketing inspector. His body will be sent to Minneapolis for burial.

W. A. Weddle was born July 23, 1880, in Marquam, where he lived until about four years of age. He then moved to Linn county, near Mt. Pleasant.

He lived in Jefferson before coming to Stayton in 1893.

March 24, 1903, he was married to Sarah Wilson in Portland. Five children were born to them.

Weddle was prominent in civic and fraternal activities. He was a member of the Church of Christ, the Masonic and Eastern Star orders, the Odd Fellows and the Rebekahs.
