Game Law Suggestions Made by Walton Group

SILVERTON—A number of recommendations in the interest of wild game preservation, were made Monday night at the meeting of the Isaak Walton league, Silverton chapter, presided over by Edwin Overlund, vice president. The recommendations were sent on to the Oregon state game commission for its annual hearing at Portland on July 13.

The local chapter voted to authorize the commission to discontinue the open season on antelope deer in Grant county area; to prohibit the issuance of any such permits as the \$500 special permits issued last year for hunting antelope deer in Lake-Klamath county area; to close the season on buck deer in Ochoco, Canyon creek and Myrtle park game reserves in 1940. The chapter also recommended that no cow elk in northeastern Oregon be hunted unless "absolutely necessary," and asked that the date of the season on the bull elk, Clatsop county be made later.

On upland game birds the Silverton chapter asked that the season on Chinese pheasants remain closed for yet this year in Clatsop, Columbia, Washington, Coos, Yamhill, Polk, Benton, Lane, Linn, Marion, Clackamas, Multnomah, Curry, Lincoln and Tillamook counties. Members of the Silverton chapter reported at least nine out of every 10 people approached, whether or not they were Waltonians, asked that the season be closed for still another year. The continuing of the closed season on mountain quail in the entire state was asked by the local group, as was also that on grouse in all other counties except Willamette, Union and Baker, and that no change be made in the season on far-bearing animals. The present season opens November 15 and closes February 15 for mink, muskrat, otter and racoon.

National defense and national resources were discussed as a combined issue. "All other matters are now subordinated to national defense, and rightly so," the local group said, "but we must not forget that long after the present European war is over, and whether or not we are involved, the economic welfare of this nation and the standard of living that will be enjoyed by future generations will depend upon its natural resource base."

The local group spoke of the "much publicized dust bowl" as a direct result of the last war "when vast areas of native range land were put under the plow to raise a few crops of wheat under the banner of national defense without looking ahead to evaluate the ultimate result."

The group urged the prompt passage of the Mundt-amended Barkley bill, and wired Oregon's congressmen to that effect. In reference to this it was pointed out that:

"Abatement of pollution is very definitely a measure of national defense. The source of water supply for hundreds of our important cities is the polluted river on whose banks the city is located. Modern science in waterworks engineering has done wonders in converting this polluted fluid into bacteriologically safe drinking water. Should this nation ever be attacked from the air these elaborate water works would be the targets for bombing planes."

Call Dams Political
The Isaak Walton chapter urged the "dropping of the non-essentials like gigantic concrete dams for hydro-power, irrigation, navigation and flood control and put that money into our national defense program. Many of these dams are being forced on the people for purely political reasons. Many of them are unwanted and are economic monstrosities, while at the same time destroying valuable resources in which the entire public is interested, as compared with temporary financial benefits that would accrue to a few from their construction. Here again many of these tremendous dams would be vulnerable targets for bombers and whole communities could be flooded out by well placed bombs."
