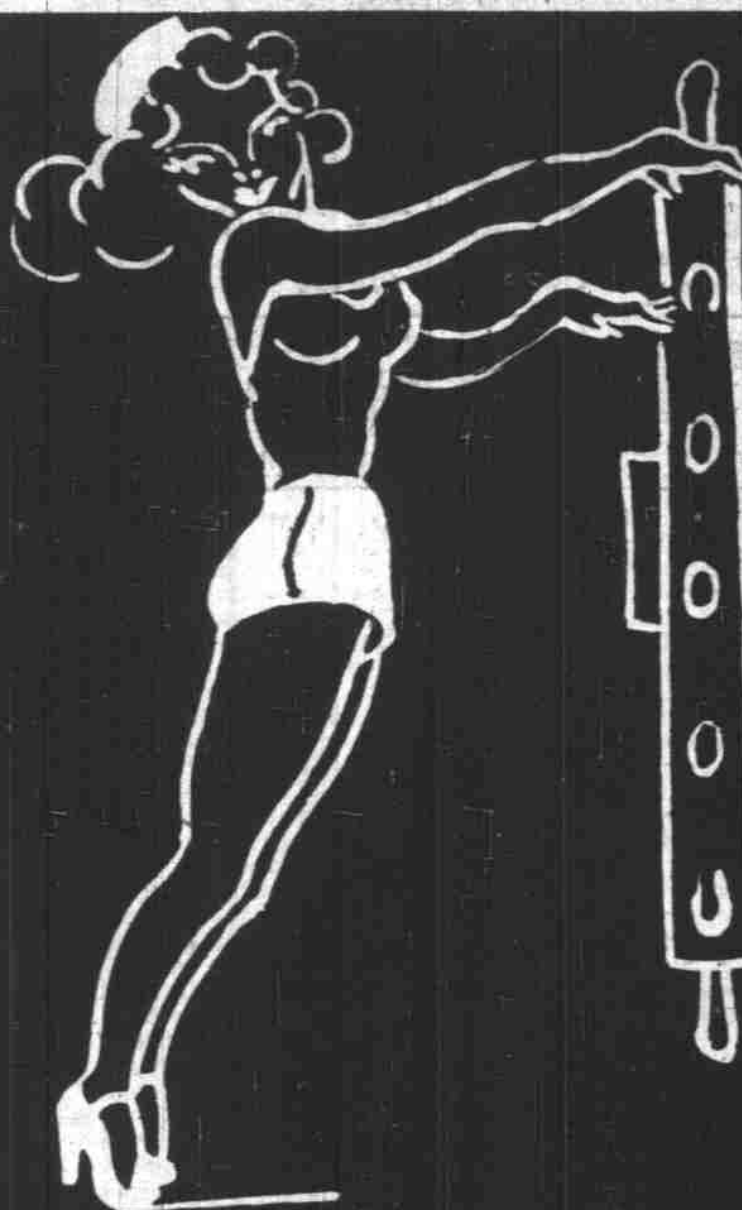
Man Is Injured On Farm Machine
