

Farley Claims All Debts Paid

Demos to Be Clear When Convention Finished; Willkie Blasted

CHICAGO, July 11—(AP)—With an air of satisfaction, National Chairman James A. Farley said today that "for the first time in history" the democratic party would have all its bills paid and money in the bank when the coming national convention is over.

The occasion for this announcement was the receipt of a \$50,000 check from Chicago business organizations, the last payment on the \$150,000 which the local citizens pledged to lure the convention here.

For the rest Farley would say but little in the course of a press conference devoted to what has now become an old game of trying to worm from him the secret which he has been grudgingly guarding since Sunday—whether President Roosevelt will accept the third term nomination which the convention is ready to give him.

Predictions that he would do so continued to accumulate meanwhile as convention notables arrived.

Headquarters for Vice-President Arthur Hays Sulzberger announced meanwhile that his name would be put before the convention by Wright Morrow, Houston lawyer.

man to make his nominating speech but would not reveal who it would be.

Senator Lucas (D-Ill) reached the city asserting that Mr. Roosevelt's foreign policy had proved "so thoroughly right" that the people would "not take 'no' for an answer" on the renomination question. Governor E. D. Rivers of Georgia said he presumed Mr. Roosevelt would be renominated and would accept.

Each took a crack at Wendell L. Willkie, the republican nominee. Lucas said Willkie was "at his peak right now," and that the people of Illinois, recalling the insull utilities collapse, would hardly support a utilities man for the presidency. He added he thought Willkie had "made a mistake" in going to Colorado for his vacation because that was "where Landon went" vacationing in 1936.

Rivers spoke of Willkie's announced plans for invading the solid south and said he would not have a chance in Georgia. In his opinion he added, that went for the rest of the south and the border states as well.

Senator Robert P. Wagner of New York, chairman of the committee which will draft the democratic platform, attended Farley's press conference, and, in response to questions, flatly denied he had brought the draft of a foreign relations plan from Washington.

Farm Income Raised in NW

Livestock Is Largest Cash Producer During 1939; Hog Products Down

WASHINGTON, DC, July 11—(AP)—Farm pocketbooks in the four northwest states were bulkier at the end of 1939.

Largely because of increased government payments, the farm income for this area last year was \$267,936,000, or \$30,824,000 greater than that for the year before.

Oregon's income for 1939 was \$102,841,000 cash income and \$6,818,000 in government payments, compared with \$100,756,000 and \$6,806,000 in 1938.

Livestock was the west's large cash producer last year, the bureau of agricultural economics reported.

Oregon got her cash income from the following sources, with 1938 figures listed first:

Cattle, calves, beef and veal, \$13,260,000 and \$14,600,000; sheep, mutton and lambs, \$5,754,000 and \$6,806,000; wool, \$3,325,000 and \$3,718,000.

Dairy products, \$18,628,000 and \$18,566,000.

Turkeys, \$3,603,000 and \$3,367,000.

Chickens, \$992,000 and \$1,277,000; eggs, \$4,810,000 and \$4,117,000.

Hogs, pork and lard about held their own in the our states in 1939 as compared with the previous year. The 1938-39 figures for this source: Oregon, \$4,690,000 and \$4,045,000.

Apple Agreement Vote To Be Closed July 15

PORTLAND, July 11—(AP)—The referendum for a marketing agreement among Oregon and Washington apple growers will close July 15. G. A. Nahstoll, field representative for the surplus marketing administration, said today.

The plan will go into operation if handlers of at least 50 per cent of the volume of apples handled in 1939 approve and if at least two-thirds the growers ratify.
