TAFT, July 11—A Salem girl in a leading position for queen and intentions of the "Whiskerinos," of Salem's famous Centennial celebration in August, to take part are promise enough that this year's Taft Redhead roundup, July 27-28, will be one of the best and most elaborate events ever staged here.

Leading among several girls for the throne of queen of the roundup is Gladys Askvig, well known Salem girl, residing at Marion hotel. Miss Askvig, though a newcomer in contests of this nature, has already garnered a total of 259,000 votes. This remarkable start is due to the splendid support given by her sponsor, Meyer's Top Notch restaurant of Salem.

To the winner of queen's throne will go a trip, all expenses paid, to the San Francisco fair. The next five highest girls will serve in the royal court with a diamond ring being given to the candidate who runs second to the queen. The contest closes with the selection of the queen on July 24.

Salem has always figured prominently in Taft's famous festival. In 1938, Nina Pahey, Salem, won the redheaded bathing beauty contest, and in 1939 Dorothy Lenon placed third in the event.
