

Contract Awarded at Albany For Rebuilding of Seed Plant

Building Will Start at Once

Structure 100 Feet Long Will Replace One Recently Burned

ALBANY—J. A. Thomsen of Philomath has been awarded the contract for the erection of the new Charles H. Lilly Seed Cleaning plant, with work on the \$25,000 structure to start immediately. The building will be erected on the site of the former Hunt Brothers' cannery which burned 10 days ago.

According to the permit the new building will be 100 feet long, and calls for heavy mill construction with a fire wall through the center.

Work is to be rushed on the new building with the hopes that the plant can be in operation within the next six weeks. This is so that the seed which the company had contracted to clean before the fire destroyed their plant, may be housed.

Captain J. P. Blin, Seattle, president of the company, has been in Albany the past few days, and is superintending the getting of the new building under way.

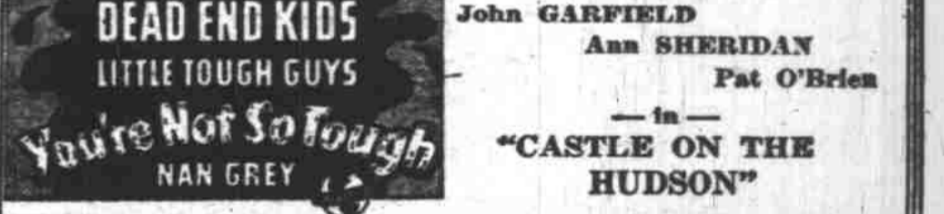
