

Industrial, Pet Parade Set For Santiam Bean Festival

Celebration Opens Tuesday

Largest Bean Can Will Be Featured Last Two Days; Sports Events Listed

STAYTON—The industrial parade of the Santiam Bean festival will take place Friday night, July 19 at 7:30. Organizations, business houses and individuals of Stayton and nearby towns are entering floats.

The pet parade will be held Saturday night when industrial parade floats will enter. Grant Murphy is the chairman of the industrial parade committee and Kenton Thompson heads the pet parade committee.

The concessions of the Brown Amusement company will open Tuesday, July 16, and continue through Saturday, July 20. The "largest bean can in the world" will furnish free bean to be dished out Friday and Saturday, July 19 and 20, only. This is being sponsored by the Stayton Canning company.

The main event in the sports of the celebration is the bicycle race. The qualifying race for the bike race on Saturday afternoon will be held Friday. The 10 winners in the qualifying race will peddle over the three-mile route at 2:30 p. m. Saturday for the Santiam valley championship. The best time recorded so far for those who have pedaled the route has been 10 1/2 minutes. The road will be closed and patrolled by police officers. Leonard Thoma is the chairman of the sports committee.

Also under sports is one of Stayton's famous water fights between the Stayton and Sublimity fire departments on Saturday night, July 20 on one of Stayton's streets. A junior water fight will follow the fire department battle, when Captain Billy Freese and his smoke eaters will vie with Captain George Meyers and his Cinder Diggers for the junior championship of this section.

There will be dances on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights. Harry Rowe was chosen chairman of the Santiam Bean festival in the place of W. A. Weddle, deceased.

Stayton Paving Costs Are Set

Property Owners Will Be Charged 30 Cents Foot for Street Frontage

STAYTON—Thirty cents per running foot will be charged property owners who wish to have their street frontage paved. Twenty feet will be done by the city. Any one wishing this done must be asked to see George R. Duncan, city recorder, at the city hall.

Distance between curbs on most streets is 40 feet. With the 20 foot center pavement deducted there will be a 10-foot unpaved section remaining on each side. Many property owners have signified their intention to pave this at their own expense.

Since this paving will be done under agreement directly with the contractor, payment must be made at time of placing the order with Duncan, who has consented to handle the matter.

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Women's Camp Opening Set

Series of Four Outings at Silver Creek Start July 16

DALLAS—A series of four vacation camps for women of Oregon are being directed by members of the Oregon State college extension staff. These camps are to be held at the Smith Creek camp in the Silver Creek recreation area about 34 miles from Albany. The dates for the four camps are July 16-17; July 24-25; July 30; August 2, August 4-5.

Each camper's cabin houses four campers. In addition to a beautiful quiet camp area there are recreational features that make a vacation in this area ideal. For entertainment there are a swimming pool and a fire circle at the camp. A library is provided at the camp by the state library.

The camp is planned to give those who attend a good rest, new interests and friends. A program is provided for those who wish to participate. A typical camp program includes several lectures, sing periods, nature walks, health and book and travel talks, swimming, vesper and campfire programs. Excellent food and good camp bedding is provided at the camp. Each camper must provide her own bedding. A fee is charged to cover the expenses of the camp. Craft materials are available at cost.

Camps are open to enrollment to all neighboring women over 20 years of age. The camp will only accommodate 50 campers. Enrollment is to be at any one of the four camps: Nellie Lyle, home demonstration agent, Eugene; W. S. Averill, county agricultural agent, Corvallis; or Hazel Packer, home demonstration agent, Gresham; W. C. Leth, Polk county agent.
