

## Stayton Truck At First Fire

Alvie Fery Home Complete Loss on Sunday; Pumper Used

STAYTON — The new Stayton fire truck was called into action for its first major fire at 8 o'clock Sunday morning, when the local fire department was summoned to extinguish a fire at the Alvie Fery home, which destroyed the house and threatened other buildings, including a fine new barn.

The origin of the fire was unknown. Fery discovered the fire before he finished dressing when he noticed burning pieces falling from the ceiling. He attempted to put in a fire alarm by phone but was unable to establish connection with the central and it is thought that the fire had already burned the telephone wires in the upper part of the house. Consequently some time was lost by having to phone from a neighboring house.

Mrs. Fery and the children, who had gone to church earlier in the morning, driving home to find the house in flames. Several pieces of furniture were saved from the front room, but the opening of the door allowed the north wind to drive the fire with more fury.

The two-story frame dwelling was a total loss, and the roof of another building about 15 feet distant was damaged more than 75 per cent. Damage to a third building was comparably negligible, being confined to the roof. None of the larger buildings on the farm was damaged, although it appeared that the fire would spread to them. There being no fire hydrant within reach the value of the suction hose on the pumper was well demonstrated because it so happened that a part of the West Stayton system of irrigation ditches crosses the road about 150 feet from the scene of the fire. From this supply of water the pumper maintained a pressure of 100 pounds on two lines of hose for an hour and a half before the fire could be considered under control.

No persons were injured in connection with the fire. The loss was partially covered by insurance.

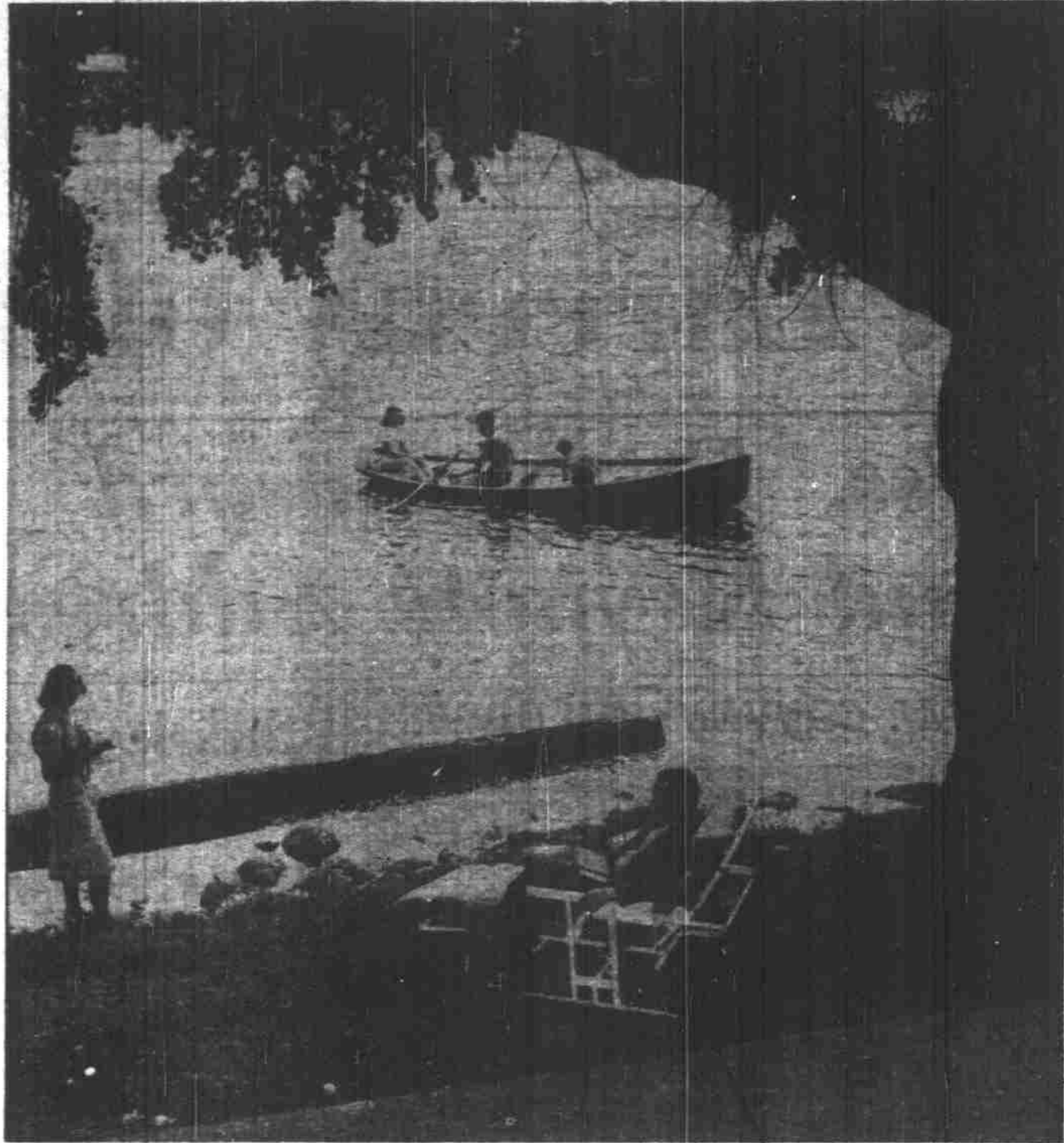
