Berry Crop Short
LEBANON—The hot, dry season has caused a short berry crop and only a few yards still have red raspberries and boysenberries to be picked. No more cherries are being brought in to the cannery and the only small fruit left to be canned are the evergreen blackberries.

Harvest Being Rushed
WHEATLAND—Harvesting various grain crops on farms in this and surrounding districts is at the peak. Every effort is being made to care for the crop while the weather is ideal.

Countless moving machines, combines and binders are running early and late. In majority of cases motor power is used while many well equipped outfits are using horses as source of power. At the Eugene Wilson farm here where approximately 500 acres of grain and grass seed was grown a new combine was purchased to used with two binders to speed up the completion of harvest.

Seed Yield Fair
Peas, common and hairy vetch for seed for cover crops in localities where it cannot be grown and the urgent demand for local growers to raise it have induced larger than usual acreage. The rank growth early in the season caused a great deal of it to go down making it tedious to harvest, growers report. All that has been combined thus far is of high quality and fair yield.

Woodburn's New Water Pump Here

WOODBURN—The Pacific Pumping company of Portland will complete installation of a new water pump for the Woodburn water department next Wednesday. The new well is located behind the city library.

The pump is a Byron Jackson submersible type being different from any other type having the motor at the bottom of the pump instead of at the top. The well is 198 feet deep and will supply water at the rate of 500 gallons a minute. The total cost including labor is estimated at \$4500.
