Canned Food Ready for Winter

Let's just look to our canning today, checking on a few items that should be added to the program these days.

Dill pickles are popular with most families, and are one of the simplest pickles to make. If you've your own cucumber vines, surplus crops will be used in the pickle jar.

GARLIC DILLS
Pack washed and preferably soaked cucumbers, in quart jars. Add a few sprigs of dill, a bay leaf, a pepper or two, a little horseradish root, a clove of garlic and two tablespoons cream rock salt, fill the jar up with cold water and shake frequently until salt is dissolved and pickles start to work. Store in a cold place, tightening lids as they loosen.

Peach-orange marmalade is a good recipe to use as the fruit comes on.

ORANGE-PEACH MARMALADE
24 medium cling peaches
6 medium oranges
16 cups sugar.
Rind of 3 oranges

Wash and peel peaches, wash oranges, remove peel from 3 of the oranges, grind fruit, combine and measure into large preserving kettle; add equal amount of sugar. Bring to boil. Boil rapidly for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally to prevent burning. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.

WATERMELON RIND PRESERVES
Dice the rind of watermelon, soak in mild salt water overnight. Drain, soak in fresh water two hours, drain. Have ready syrup made of one cup sugar to one cup water to which two sliced lemons have been added for rind of each watermelon used. Cook until rind looks clear. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.

Canning Bulletin Available

Probably no publication at Oregon State college is more in demand at this time of the year than the bulletin on "Home Food Preservation," which includes instructions on canning, drying, salting, smoking, and storing various kinds of food products.

For the second time this publication has been revised and brought up to date, and now the third edition is off the press and ready for free distribution to Oregon citizens. Many authorities at the college have cooperated in the preparation of the bulletin, which has Lucy A. Case, extension specialist in nutrition, as the principal author.

"In this bulletin we have tried to give details and schedules which will bring successful results if carefully followed," says Miss Case. "Final success, however, will depend upon painstaking care in following each step. This is particularly true with respect to preservation of temperature. It is important that the temperatures prescribed be high enough so that foods are adequately processed in the required time."

The bulletin includes directions for canning vegetables, fish and preserves described include the hot water bath, pressure cooker, and open kettle methods. One section deals with drying fruits and vegetables. A handy tabulated list gives a quick reference table for canning vegetables, fruit, meats, poultry and fish.

"The preservation of surplus products at home for family use or exchange makes possible a variety in diet and reduces the cost of living for many families," Miss Case points out. "By the use of home grown garden vegetables during many months of the year, and an adequate supply of preserved foods for other seasons of the year, it is possible for the average family to be supplied adequately with vitamins and other essential food elements with a minimum outlay of cash."

The new edition, Extension, Extension Bulletin No. 542, may be had from any county extension office, or direct from the college.

Ice Creams Are Easily Made

Homemade ice creams and sherbets may gain smoothness without richness when evaporated milk is used. Rhubarb-pineapple sherbet is a seasonal dessert, easily prepared and inexpensive.

RHUBARB-PINEAPPLE SHERBET
2 1/2 cups sliced rhubarb
1 can crushed pineapple (1 1/2 cups)
1/2 cup sugar
1 1/2 cups irradiated evaporated milk
1 1/2 teaspoon mace or nutmeg
Cut unpeeled rhubarb into small pieces. Combine with pineapple and sugar and simmer until tender. Press through a coarse sieve. There should be 2 cups pulp and syrup. Chill. Chill milk thoroughly and whip very stiff. Fold in the chilled rhubarb mixture. Pour at once into cold freezing trays. Yield: About 3 pints.

Mothers find it's easy and inexpensive to make ice cream sodas for their children at home. A serving of ice cream in half a glass of carbonated beverage does the trick.

1 orange
1 lemon
Juice and grated rind of both
Combine ingredients; cook until thick and clear. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.
