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the shackles of Versailles," and it would have been possible to achieve this aim peacefully. His pre-war policy in pursuit of this aim, he said, was two-fold: "real friendship with Italy and a similar relationship with England."

At Munich, in September, 1938, it even seemed as though this peaceful revision actually would be realized, he told his uniformed audience.

It was a time when, "thanks to growing common sense, it appeared as though international cooperation might lead to peaceful solution of the remaining problems. But the agreement to this end, signed in Munich on Sept. 29, 1938, by the four leading interested states, was not only not welcomed in London and Paris, but was actually condemned as a sign of abominable weakness."

The Munich agreement was condemned and sabotaged, he went on, because peaceful revision threatened to upset the plans of "Jewish capitalist war-mongers... free-masons, armament manufacturers and war profiteers, international business men, stock exchange speculators."

And so it came about that Poland was "pushed into war" and the peace over Germany made after conclusion of the Polish campaign denounced as "cowardly."

PORTLAND, Ore., July 19.—(P)—Wet grounds tonight delayed both games in the state semi-pro baseball tournament.

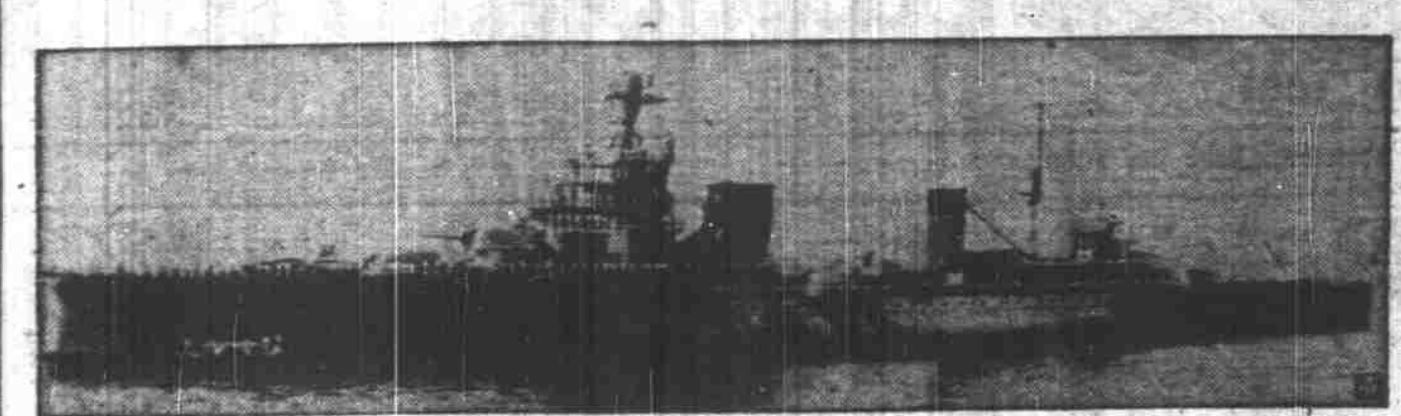

11,200 Will Be in State CCC Camps

Includes 2000 Oregonians; 591 to Be Enlisted This Month

WASHINGTON, July 19.—(P)—The civilian conservation corps will employ 11,200 men in Oregon's conservation program in the quarter year ending September 30, James J. McEntee, CCC director, said today.

The workers will include 2000 Oregon young men, 194 war veterans and 9006 men from other states. McEntee said 56 camps would operate.

Of the 11,200 enrollees employed in Oregon, 5200 will work on forest improvement, development and protection, 1800 on range rehabilitation, 1800 on reclamation projects, 1000 under the supervision of the general land office, 800 on erosion control on agricultural lands, 600 on wildlife projects, 400 in state parks and 200 in Crater Lake National park.

To fill vacancies left by men whose enlistment periods have expired, the corps will enroll 591 Oregonians this month, McEntee said.

Seek Opening Of Bottleneck

Defense Is Motive for Sector Improvement; Bids Awarded

PORTLAND, July 19.—(P)—The state highway commission's support of a move to have the federal government reconstruct the crooked southern end of the Pacific highway as a defense project was asked today by a southern Oregon delegation.

The delegation did not request funds from the commission.

"We ask you to consider this from a national viewpoint," A. C. Marsters of Roseburg, delegation spokesman, said. "This entire stretch of territory is absolutely unprotected. The Pacific highway is the one link between southern California and Washington."

The commission was not asked to commit itself and did not do so. Southern Oregon groups have advocated straightening of the bottleneck between Roseburg and Grants Pass for many years, declaring it would increase tourist travel. They now urge the project as a national defense measure, explaining that effective movement of troops over the route is physically impossible.

Armstrong and Jenkins Get Dough, Agree to Stage Re-Play of Fight

NEW YORK, July 19.—(AP)—The state athletic commission cleared the way today for Henry Armstrong and Lew Jenkins to get paid for their fight Wednesday night, and Promoter Mike Jacobs immediately announced plans for a return match between the two in Madison Square Garden September 27.

The commission, which had held up the fighters' purses without giving any reason yesterday, cleared up the "mystery" and then soothed its "day suspension" on Eddie Mead, Armstrong's manager, for an unimportant row over hand bandages a few minutes before Tuesday's bout started.

The commissioners explained that they held the purses only because they wanted Welterweight Boss Armstrong and Lightweight Champion Jenkins to post forfeits to make the next defenses of their titles in this state. Promoter Jacobs immediately returned to his office and mailed the forfeit money to the fight fathers. The commissioners, after weighing thought, decided Armstrong must fight for his 147-pound crown "on or about" October 26 and Jenkins must put his lightweight title up around November 11.

Both fighters agreed to re-play of Wednesday's fight.
