

250 Concluding Swim Classes

Public Demonstration Will Be Given at Silverton This Afternoon

SILVERTON — Today marks the close of the Red Cross swimming classes at the new municipal pool, which for the past two weeks have been under the direction of Esther Arnold and Barbara Kurtz, serving without pay.

Two hundred and fifty eight have had advantage of instruction, with a group of adults, beginners and advanced swimmers and divers making up the group. The tiny kiddies are named the Tad Poles and are from the ages of five to seven or eight.

Judge George Rossman of Salem will present the awards. Demonstrations will begin at 2 p. m. Bob Sweeney and Duke Mankurtz of Salem will appear in life saving stunts. A boat will be provided for the pool for life saving demonstrations.

Beginners must pass tests of breath holding, rhythmic breathing, prone float, prone glide, back float, back glide, kick glide on front and on back, arm stroke, finning, combined stroke front and back, change of direction, turning over, leveling off, jump into waist deep water, plain front dive, 1st combined test and 2nd combined test.

Intermediates do fewer stunts but more difficult in execution, with the swimmer class going the very professional and finished races.

The public is welcome to attend the afternoon program when R. A. Fish, city alderman and pool chairman, will be official host to the group.
