

Industry Hope Said Merchant Marine

Harbors Congress Hears Projects Lose out to Defense

Toledo, Ore., July 20—(AP)—The hope of American industry and indeed of the American merchant marine, Dean Johnson, general manager of the C. D. Johnson Lumber corporation here, told the northwest rivers and harbors congress Friday.

"Ocean shipping" he described as "a primary essential to American business which must face the crisis of an economic war in a troubled world. If we do not bring the American merchant marine out of the doldrums, foreign industry and commerce inevitably will bring disaster to American business and our standard of living."

"Importance of the development of rivers and harbors to facilitate the shipping life lines of industry should be a keystone in our national defense program."

V. A. Davis, president of the port of Camas-Washougal, Wash., invited the congress to hold its 1941 convention there.

Rivers and harbors projects will decrease in the coming year "because of the move to spend all available money for national defense purposes," Major C. R. Moore of Portland, district army engineer, said. Projects essential to the navy will receive consideration.

"Oregon is now the top state in the nation's lumber industry," Moore said, "and her rivers and harbors are becoming increasingly important in transportation of logs and manufactured products. The need for adequate water transportation in Oregon was never greater."

The disric army teneiger said Oregon's Willamette valley has increased its logging operations more than any other northwest section. The passage of logs through the Oregon City locks last year was 17 times greater than ever before, he explained.

er, and she became one of Salem's leading pioneers, and foremost supporters of Willamette university when it sorely needed support.

In the third residence for whites erected on the site of Salem, now at 1325 Ferry street, is a lot of the kind of cedar built-in furniture that was designed to be used by Rev. Olney in his house then under construction when he lost his life.

In all such houses, the panes of window glass were (and are) small. It was evidently considered safer against breakage in shipping around the horn to use small panes rather than large ones. The frame work was done here by the mission and pioneer carpenters and furniture makers.

The Indian cemetery at the original Lee mission was on the knoll a few rods southeast of the marker. Collectors, for years, found beads and other Indian relics there.

Cyrus Shepard, original missionary with Lee in 1824, brought garden and flower seeds in his saddle bags across the plains. He was a fine gardener, and volunteer garden and flower crops persisted near the marker for years; especially apparatus, up to five or six years ago.

The mission rose was luxuriant there, for years after the "old" mission was abandoned. There are two stories about the mission rose—one that Mrs. Alanson Beers was presented with a bouquet of those roses in her Connecticut home on her departure to join the Lausanne party; that she nursed it and brought it to life in her Oregon mission home. The other story has the mission rose coming by way of a Hudson's Bay company's brigade. Anyway, it is a great rose.

Seedling apple trees are found on the mission site, also on the Joseph Gervais place two miles below, growing along with other forest trees.

faith fall. They went in the spirit of their Master, testifying by their death the reality of their faith in the Eternal, Invisible One who had promised to keep what they had committed to Him.

"Wonderful record they left for those 'who follow in their train!'"

The writer agrees with the editorial that the earth will probably not strike a meteor and be broken to pieces, as the lady in her dismay was almost ready to wish.

But, just as certain as that the Bible is God's Word to the world—there is a day coming, "a day of the Lord" that shall come "as a thief in the night" (to those who are not expecting it). When "the heavens shall pass away with a great noise, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat, the earth also and the works that are therein shall be burned up." Peter 3:10. It is very evident from the content that this is not a symbolic language but a plain statement of future events.

Peter says in a preceding verse that the heavens and the earth... are reserved unto fire against the day of judgment and prediction of ungodly men.

Verse nine tells us that "the Lord is not slack concerning his promise... but is long suffering to us ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance."

There are numerous texts purporting to be from the Bible, but in these heartbreaking days, it is fitting that we turn to the Book of books and read and ponder upon the words of Rev. 11:18: "And the nations were angry and thy wrath is come, and the time of the dead, that they should be judged... and shouldst destroy them which destroy the earth."

(This is no escape promise for these.)

Again, we read in Rev. 6:15, "And the kings of the earth, and the great men, and the rich men, and the chief captains, and the mighty men, and every free man, hid themselves in the dens and in the rocks of the mountains; and said to the mountains and rocks, 'Fall on us, and hide us from the face of him that sitteth on the throne, and from the wrath of the Lamb' for the great day of his wrath is come; and who shall be able to stand?"

The question is answered in Luke 21:36 "Watch ye therefore, and pray always that ye may be accounted worthy to escape all these things that should come to pass, and to stand before the Son of Man."

There is an added admonition in the 34th verse, "take heed to your selves, lest at any time your hearts be overcharged with surfeiting and drunkenness, and cares of this life and so that day come upon you unawares."

The first record we have of man's desire is found in Gen. 3:3. When Adam and Eve had disobeyed their God and Creator they went and hid themselves from the presence of the Lord. But then, as ever, there was no escape from God and the Lord God called unto Adam, "Where art thou?"

Jonah was another who attempted to run away from God and duty, but was unsuccessful. It is certain that no man can escape God but there is an escape provided by Him for those who "suffer according to the will of God" and commit the keeping of their souls to Him in well doing, as unto a faithful Creator, Peter 4:19.

To these are given "exceeding great and precious promises" that they may escape the pollution of the world through the knowledge of the Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. (2 Peter 2:20.) The fate of this world is portrayed in the Scriptures. The "tide of battle will not always ebb and flow" while wars "wax and wane." He that sitteth upon the throne in heaven has said "Behold I make all things new," and "he that overcometh shall inherit all things; and I will be his God, and he shall be my son."

Holland Officials Arrested, Claimed

AMSTERDAM, July 20—(Saturday)—(Via Berlin)—A number of persons connected with the Dutch colonial administration have been taken into custody. It was announced officially last night, in reprisal against what German authorities described as "mistreatment" of Germans in the Netherlands East Indies.

At the same time, all mails to Netherlands overseas possessions were stopped.

A German spokesman yesterday had intimated that Germany would act against persons now in German-occupied Holland because of alleged mistreatment of Germans in both The Netherlands East and West Indies.

The spokesman, saying German authorities regretted being "obliged to act," declared, "East and West Indian authorities are responsible. They don't understand how Europeans in the colonies have to be treated and don't appreciate the good treatment (by Germany) of Dutch war prisoners."

Consul and Wife Possibly Victims

TIENSIN, July 20—(AP)—A bullet-riddled automobile in which French Consul L. Colin and his wife were reported to have set out for Peiping this morning was found abandoned today midway on the Tiensin-Peiping road. The car bore license plates of the French Consulate.

Nothing had been heard from the couple here since their departure and their whereabouts was unknown.

It is likewise just as clear a fact that the result of the 1936 electoral landslide could have been changed by redistribution of far less than 25 per cent of the popular vote.

But does this mean Willkie is in the bag? Far from it, in my opinion.

Reason is on the side of the republicans this time, but emotions are still with the third term party. There are millions of people today whose emotional self-interest has completely sold them on Roosevelt; beyond the ability of reason to challenge. He could do anything, and they would still vote for him, because they believe he personally is responsible for their old age security, their farm checks, public work, their union or just simply because they think he is for the poor man, and they are still poor.

If Willkie is going to crack this blind faith, he must reach down below the white collar middle classes. Today I do not believe Willkie is widely known or understood among the voters. They have not yet become acquainted with him. He cannot depend on intelligence to do the job. He cannot reach them with reason alone. He must make an emotional appeal, a wide, deep and stirring national crusade to establish himself as an authentic champion of the great majority. He must prove his worth by his campaign.

So I think the election is all up to Willkie, up to his actions and ability. There is nothing much Mr. Roosevelt can do for

himself, except to patch his fences where he can, and play fences and war as much as he can, permitting his flame throwers to beat the bushes and arouse emotions against "bankers, Wall Streeters" with effective theme.

Roosevelt has his votes. Willkie must win his. But I have not yet found a republican who doubts Willkie's ability to meet the test.

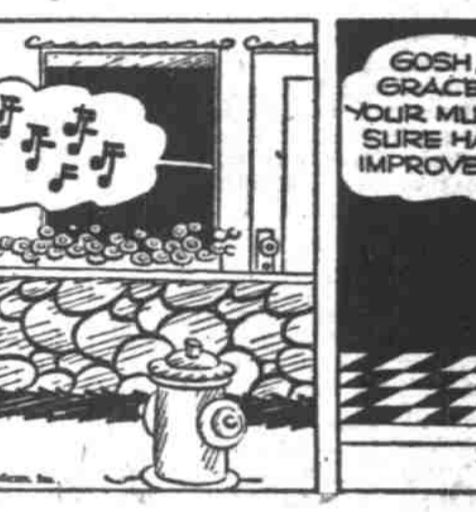
