

4H Livestock Tour Coming

Members to Visit Farms, Plants During Three Days

Marion county 4H club members whose projects are concerned with stock raising and scientific farming will participate in the annual valley livestock and crops tour sponsored by the state college and the 4H organization next Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, according to announcement sent out by Wayne D. Harding, county club agent.

Each boy participating in the tour has been asked to supply himself with bedding, eating and cooking utensils and toilet articles for use during two overnight stops at Benton-Lane park near Corvallis.

Marion county club members will leave by truck from the east entrance of the courthouse at 8:30 a. m. next Tuesday, and will join club members from other counties at the Nebergall packing plant in Albany at 9:30 a. m.

The group will tour the meat plant, and from there will visit farms near Albany and Corvallis for demonstrations and lectures on different phases of farm and stock management.

The program for the second day will include beef cattle judging, sheep judging and management, while the last day of the journey will be occupied with crop and irrigation studies, dairy judgment and management, and a tour of the Chase garden greenhouse in Eugene.

The Marion county party will return late Thursday afternoon.

Hearings Resume, Power Accounting

PORTLAND, July 24-(P)—A hearing on a power commission proposal to adjust accounting methods of the Northwest Electric company was resumed today by Examiner Norman B. Gray. Testimony centered upon whether to place \$3,500,000 representing the par value of common stock in an "organization" account or in an "adjustment" account.

The power commission favored the adjustment account in its program to establish a uniform accounting system for utilities.

Two Are Sought, Rabies Treatment

Will Seek Word On Dam Speed-up

PORTLAND, July 24-(P)—Seeking information on the national defense program for northwest industries, two Bonneville power administration executives were enroute to Washington, DC, today.

The men, Ivan Block of the market development section and Raymond M. Miller, senior metallurgist, may receive news of an emergency program to speed up Bonneville construction, Administrator Paul J. Raver said.

Early Salem Street Car Is Found In Back Yard; Now Houses Chickens

Ancient enough to be the centerpiece for a semi-centennial celebration is the street car discovered in the backyard of the W. H. Burger residence, 1745 Chemeketa street. Once operated by the Salem Motor

Railway company and possibly before 1890 as a horse car, the present chicken house and storage shed retains faint vestige of its former days.

Its precise age and history unknown, the vehicle was in its present position without wheels, and looking old at the time the Burgers acquired the property. The original roof has been replaced with shingles.

In faded paint appears the wording, Salem Motor R. W. Co. Also disclosed was that it operated on Commercial street near No. 12. A sign on the rear platform ordered "no smoking." In iron castings is the name of the manufacturing company in St. Louis, Mo.

The car is ten feet in length, about six in width and probably carried up to a dozen passengers. R. J. Hendricks was president of the first transportation system, the Salem Street Railway company, it was recalled. The concern, incorporated in 1878, used horse cars on the dirt streets. The Capital City Street Railway company, in 1889, began the use of electric coaches, among the first of their kind in use in the world. The original company reorganized in the early '90s as the Capital City Railway company and acquired a 30-year franchise.

In 1893, 12 miles of lines were operated. These were expanded but little during the 30 years the lines continued to operate.

Advises Special Care Next Week Against Thefts

Salem residents were advised by Chief of Police Frank A. Minto yesterday to plan to take more than ordinary precautions against prowlers during the city's Centennial celebration next week.

"The number of petty burglaries always increases when large crowds are in town despite all we try to do to prevent them," the chief declared.

Minto suggested that householders make sure garages and houses are securely locked before going away and porch lights turned off. He suggested leaving a light burning in some room other than a front hall.

Archives Transfer May Have to Wait

A proposal to transfer approximately 10,000 records of Oregon's provisional territorial governments from the Oregon State Historical society in Portland to a state building here probably will not be attempted until the 1941 legislative session, the board of control decided yesterday.

The society protested against the removal of the records on the ground that it is in a better position to obtain information from these documents than the state would be.

Cruiser Captain Dies From Wound

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, July 24 (P)—Captain Umberto Navaro, commander of the Italian cruiser Bartolomeo Colleoni, which was sunk in battle last Friday, died of his wounds today and was buried with British naval honors. Officers of the Australian cruiser Sydney, which sank the Italian ship in a battle near Crete in the Mediterranean, attended the funeral. A squad of seamen from British destroyers fired the last salute.

Lightning Causes New Forest Fires

MISSOULA, Mont., July 24-(P)—More than 300 new fires in the western Montana and north Idaho forests today prevented any attempt at relaxation by fire fighters strung from the Salmon mountains to the Canadian line.

One hundred ten of the new fires were started by lightning last night and the others were hangovers from the Saturday storm, the forest service fire control office reported.

Judge Zimmerman Changes to GOP

ASTORIA, July 24-(P)—Circuit Judge Howard K. Zimmerman has changed his registration from democrat to republican, explaining "I wanted to see whether Roosevelt would be renominated before I changed."

He described the November election as a "contest between dictatorship and anti-dictatorship."

Ocean Washes up Body

Where Others Recovered

SEASIDE, July 24-(P)—The ocean washed up the body of John Mulford, 50, of Portland, last night. He drowned at a Gearhart pre-dawn swimming party Sunday.

The body was recovered at almost the identical spot where two other surf victims have been washed in by the tide in recent months.

Nearly Third of File Of Jobless Over 45

Nearly a third of the unemployed on the active file at 21 state employment offices are over 45 years of age, officials said a check of records disclosed.

Those between 21 and 44 years comprise 43 per cent while the remainder are under 21.

Hard to Get out, Noted in Canada

Carry Identification, Is Lampport's Advice to Hollywood Lions

Americans planning trips to Canada should carry definite identification papers with them because "it is easy to get in but hard to get out," Frederick S. Lampport, delegate to the republican national convention, told the Hollywood Lions club at Shattuck's Wednesday noon.

Lampport, who toured Canada en route home from the convention, advised Oregon residents going to the dominion to obtain letters of introduction from either Senator Charles L. McNary or Congressman James W. Mott.

Oregon delegates intentionally held out for Senator McNary until the next to the last ballot for the presidential nomination in order to keep his name before the convention as a vice-presidential prospect, Lampport said. The local delegation, he reported, was met at the train in Philadelphia by Joe Singer, long-time sergeant-at-arms in the Oregon house of representatives. He was an assistant in the same capacity at the convention.

The Hollywood Lions club, it was announced, will hold no meeting of its own next week but will instead meet with the downtown club next Thursday noon for a Centennial session.

Few Places Open In Metal Classes

High School Graduates May Be Instructed for Plane Work

A few more vacancies are available in the courses offered at the senior high school vocational shop for young men wishing to enter aviation sheet metal work. Classes which started Monday are intended to prepare young men for entry in aircraft factories on the Pacific coast. The work consists of blueprint reading, template layout, metal forming, handling of the new alclad and dural metal, riveting and assembling.

Enrollment is confined to young men between the ages of 18 to 25 who are high school graduates or the equivalent. Trade school diploma or work experience is considered equivalent and those who have had at least two years of mechanical drawing and shop work are qualified.

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Benton-Polk Line Is "Each Other's"

Benton and Polk counties apparently have no definite common boundary line although they adjoin, Nellie B. Pipes, librarian for the Oregon Historical society, declared here Wednesday.

Miss Pipes said she had discovered that the north boundary of Benton had been fixed as the south boundary of Polk county.

"This would have been proper," Miss Pipes said, "except that the south boundary of Polk county was fixed as the north boundary of Benton county."

Miss Pipes asked that the next legislature fix a legal boundary line for the two counties.
