Peace Commission Holds Conference; Group to Meet With L. Melo

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from posed by Argentine's lone opposition to the United States proposals for an American trusteeship over the European colonies in the western hemisphere was indicated when members of the peace sub-committee agreed on recommendations.

SHANGHAI, July 27.—(Saturday)—Japanese military authorities declared today the foreign areas in Shanghai "in bounds" to Japanese soldiers on leave, arousing fears of a multiplication of the unpleasant incidents which have disturbed Japanese-American relations in recent weeks.

Simultaneously it was reported from Tientsin that Japanese restrictions virtually have halted the activities of American traders in north China. This report coincided with United States action in licensing all its own oil and scrap iron exports.

(In Tokyo the presidential licensing order was regarded as intended to curb Japan as well as being aimed at Germany and Italy, and the Japanese ambassador in Washington was directed to investigate the new control.)

The action of the Japanese in permitting their service men on liberty to have free range of the Shanghai foreign concessions was a radical one, although foreign quarters conceded that the Japanese had a right to do so. Heretofore, the foreign areas with the exception of Japanese occupied Hongkew, have been out of bounds for the soldiers.

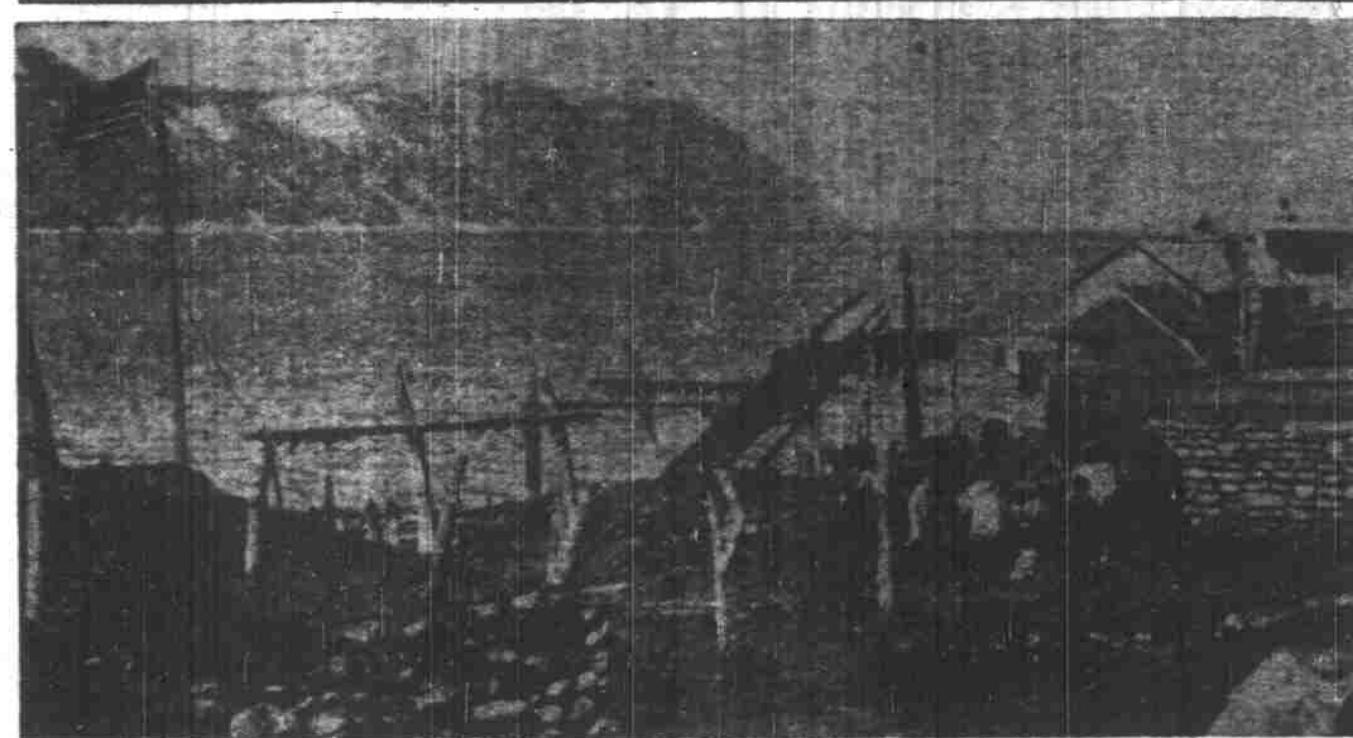
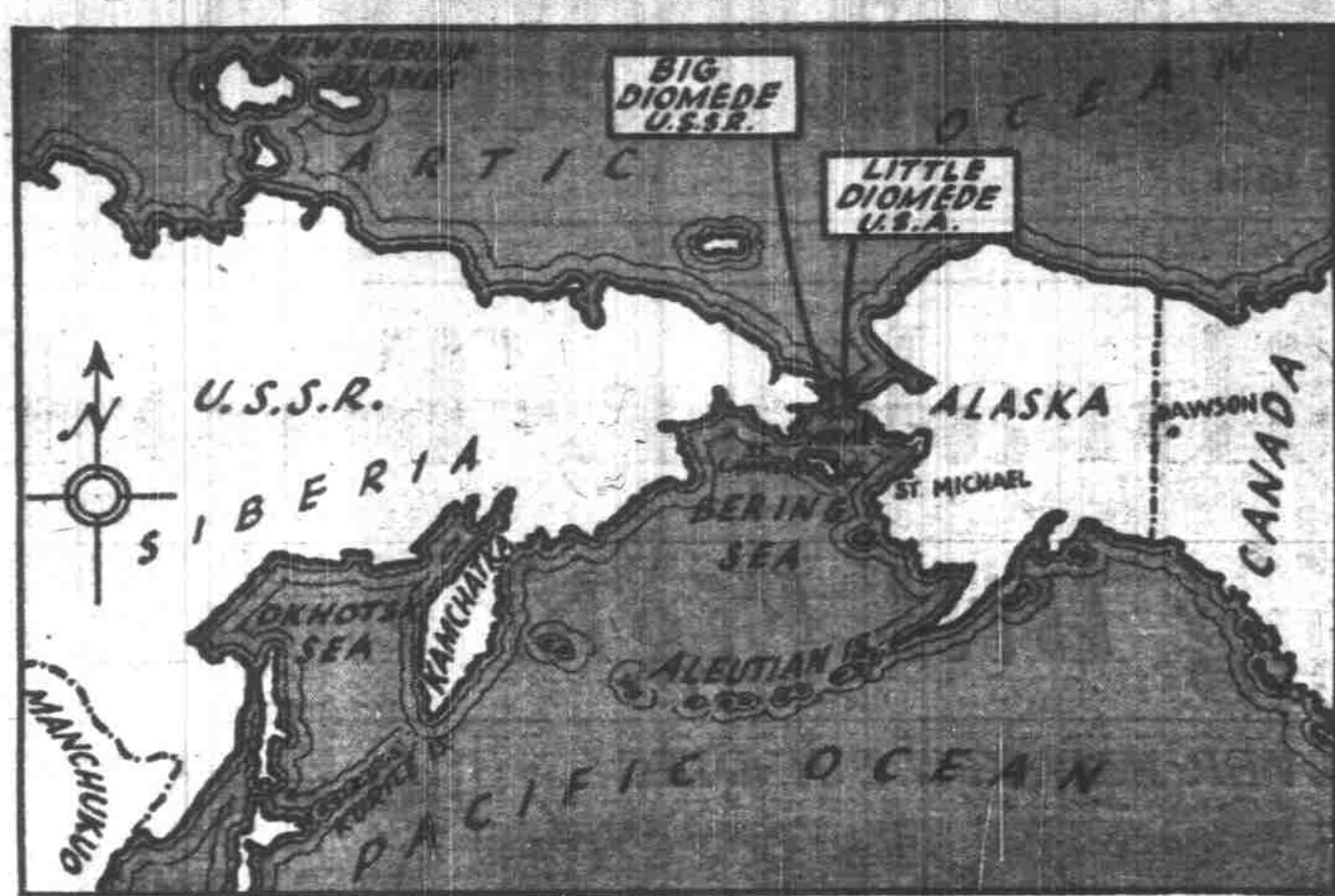

Reports soviet Russia has established a hangar, air field and submarine base on Big Diomedes island, in the Bering strait, 130 miles northwest of Nome, Alaska, were verified recently upon arrival of the coast guard cutter Perseus at Seattle. The cutter visited Little Diomedes island, US owned, one mile from Russian-owned Big Diomedes. Eskimos living in the tiny village on Little Diomedes (Russia's possession may be seen in background) reported soviet soldiers had barred them from trading while the north end of Big Diomedes was being leveled. Scrap Embargo Is Urged for Canada

VANCOUVER, B.C., July 26.—(AP)—Mayor Lyle Taylor moved here today to urge the Canadian government to place an embargo on exports of scrap iron, concentrates, oil and similar products to "other than allied countries" for duration of the war.

Copies of a resolution to be submitted by him to the city council next Tuesday have been sent to Prime Minister Mackenzie King and the minister of defense, and he will ask the city council to forward the resolution to the forthcoming union of B. C. municipalities convention for endorsement.

The mayor has in the past attacked shipments of copper, nickel and scrap iron from Canada to Japan.

Liquor Commission Gives 16 Licenses

PORTLAND, July 26.—(AP)—Increased sale of intoxicants to minors was reported by the state liquor control commission today, with the explanation that the condition was offset by a greater number of arrests.

The commission granted 16 new licenses, refused 38, revoked two and suspended six at the first session and devoted today's business to hearing appeals from persons previously denied permits.

The Portland area will add another state-controlled store.

Apology or Jail Is Verdict Given to Bitten Postman

PORTLAND, July 26.—(AP)—Because Mail Carrier Lowery Huey killed the 27th dog to bite him in 13 years, he'll have to apologize to the owner or go to jail.

Municipal Judge Julius Cohn fined him \$50 and offered the alternative of an apology to Mrs. John G. Lake or 30 days in jail.

Huey was convicted of damaging personal property by heaving a pair of grass shears at the dog after it had chewed his leg. Judge Cohn passed sentence without comment today, although he delayed it yesterday with the suggestion that many chewings mitigated the seriousness of the charge.

Bill for Refugee Transport Backed

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vessel is a refugee-child rescue ship of the United States or under United States registry, so that night or day there can be no mistake as to the identity of such vessel."

At hearings on the measure, witnesses after witness told the committee there would be no trouble in placing refugee children in private homes here.

Discussing the refugee problem in general, President Roosevelt told his press conference that the first step was to get passports in the hands of 10,000 or more children. Next, he said, would be to find out whether the British government could send the children to this country, or Canada, in British vessels.

The question of sending American vessels for them, he concluded, might be reached a little later.

Counties League Dues Are Okeh

PORTLAND, July 26.—(AP)—Circuit Judge Alfred P. Dobson ruled today that Multnomah county commissioners had the legal right to draw on the county treasurer to pay dues in the Association of Oregon Counties.

The decision followed hearing of a test case filed by V. G. Walker, a taxpayer, questioning authority of the board to direct payment of \$569 to the association.

Judge Dobson's decision in part said "... the court is impelled to hold that the expenditure sought to be enjoined in this cause is one which must be sanctioned as coming within the purview of the general responsibilities imposed upon the county courts and boards of commissioners, to have general care and management of the county property, funds and business, where the law does not otherwise expressly provide."

Tanks Arrive for Armored Division

FORT KNOX, Ky., July 26.—(AP)—Fifty light tanks arrived tonight by rail from Fort Lewis, Wash., in what was described by an army source as part of a "transfer of personnel and equipment for formation of the First Armored Division."

The 10-ton tanks, first of their type to be stationed here, constitute the major realignment of forces contemplated for this post under a recent war department order establishing new armored divisions here and at Fort Benning, Ga.

Thirty similar tanks are expected from Fort Meade, Md.

Doesn't Report, Discovered Sick

GOLD BEACH, Ore., July 26.—(AP)—Failure of Patrolman Lloyd Hickok of Johnson Butte to make his regular, hourly radio report to forest fire patrol headquarters probably saved his life.

Hickok complained of severe pains and failed to call in on his next scheduled report. Investigators found him ill at his station and brought him here for an emergency appendicitis operation.

War Over by Fall Says Ousted Nazi

Says Germany Intends No American Invasion After England

LOS ANGELES, July 26.—(AP)—Arthur Dietrich, ousted press attache of the Mexico City German legation, told ship reporters today the European war will be over by October 1, with the complete collapse of Great Britain.

After that, he said, Germany will institute a world system of bilateral trade in which the Americas and other sections of the world must participate.

"When the war is over," said Dietrich, en route to Germany via Japan and Russia, "we will prove that we have no intention of invading either the territories or the rights of American nations. America has no reason for wanting to fight Germany. However, feeling in the United States against Germany is really growing worse because of the propaganda campaign of the British and Jews."

"The United States has a right to take over the West Indies owned by England and France. Canada should be an independent nation."

"Germany will demand return of her territories in Africa taken after the World war, but the possession of her former Pacific islands must be settled with Japan."

Dietrich emphasized that the United States must avert conflict with Germany after the European war if she accepts Germany's new economic plan.

He did not deny he had conducted an extensive propaganda campaign throughout Latin America from Mexico City, predicting that "new things are going to happen in this hemisphere and all over the world."

Red Cross Nears 20 Million Goal

WASHINGTON, July 26.—(AP)—American Red Cross said tonight that the \$20,000,000 war relief goal was almost attained and that the money had been confiscated by the German military.

Davis said in a radio address (CBS) that the fund now totaled \$19,823,510.

Taking cognizance of the reports that Red Cross money and supplies had been seized by Germany, Davis asserted:

"I am unable to state categorically that the German authorities have not seized one cent of Red Cross funds nor have they taken a single item of our supplies."

POPULAR BLUFF, Mo., July 26.—(AP)—A baby which "undoubtedly weighed 20 pounds at birth" was reported here tonight by County Health Officer J. W. McPeckers.

The baby, a girl, was born 10 days ago to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hunter, negroes of nearby Morocco. Hunter claimed the child, though, he said, weighed 20 pounds at birth.

McPeckers said the child weighed 16 pounds 2 ounces today and since a new-born baby normally loses some weight, it could be added, easily have weighed what the father claimed at birth.

"I never saw one like it," the physician said.

Age Assistance to Expand This Fall

Applications Number 4000 Since November, 1939; Investigation on

PORTLAND, July 26.—(AP)—New old age assistance grants will be made commencing October 1, the state public welfare commission decided today.

Some of the 4000 applications received since November, 1939, will be given aid under the program. Cases so far have been reduced from 11,000 to 19,000 through death and reevaluation. The commission said further reductions would be made through further reevaluation to be completed by October 1.

A tentative 1941-42 budget of more than \$22,500,000 was approved for submission to state authorities.

The budget, approximately \$4,000,000 higher than for the previous biennium, contemplates a \$10,000,000 legislative appropriation, \$4,400,000 from federal sources and \$5,100,000 from Oregon counties.

Chairman Jack Luhn said the increase was largely due to expanded demands for old age assistance.

The state's whole welfare program, the commission said, is operating on a revenue deficit although it still is within appropriations.

State Committee To Meet Thursday

The state executive committee of the Oregon Pension federation will meet at the Salem chamber of commerce at 10:30 o'clock next Thursday morning to discuss pension initiatives and election procedure, John S. Marshall, chairman, announced yesterday.

The committee particularly will discuss the question of supporting or ignoring the only pension initiative on the November ballot, a measure sponsored by the Oregon Merchants Legislative league, redefining lotteries and providing for use of part of the proceeds for old age assistance.

Support of candidates favorable to pensions also will be considered.

Says Encirclement Threatens US—if

Former Budget Director Douglas Gives His Reply in Spanish

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26.—(AP)—it took a Spanish with a flair for decoding difficult penmanship to get Lewis W. Douglas's reaction to Wendell Willkie's campaign today.

Douglas, the new deal's first budget director, recently announced his support of the republican national ticket. An interviewer asked what he would do for Willkie and Douglas sprawled the reply in Spanish.

Translated, it read:

"Who knows, as we say in Mexico."

"A third term even in the days of Thomas Jefferson was considered a threat to democracy," Douglas remarked—this time in English. "Today with even greater power centered in the federal government that threat is greater than ever."

Douglas, in Portland to address a service club and meet Oregon officers of the life insurance company he heads, predicted that the United States might be economically encircled by totalitarian powers if Great Britain was defeated.

"We must help England if we are to help ourselves," he told a service club. "It is not a case of pulling England's chestnuts out of the fire, it is simply saving ourselves."

The British fleet, he said, has policed the Atlantic ocean for the United States for many years.

"Take the British fleet away and we face the great chance of encirclement—encirclement from the south, the east, and yes, perhaps even from the north," he declared.
