

Junior Farmers Union Camp Will Open Monday at Camp Cleowax; Is Statewide

Recreation, Studies Set

Marion County Group Is to Pay Transportation Expenses for Outing

LIBERTY—Final plans for this year's state Junior Farmers Union camp are now completed and enthusiasm and keen anticipation is apparent among the Junior Farmers groups. Camp Cleowax, near Florence was chosen for its excellent facilities for comfort, recreation and sports possibilities for an organization of this size, comprising representatives from groups all over the state.

Mrs. Jessie Williams, state Junior leader, has made all arrangements and secured supplies of food, equipment and material for classes for the five-day camp. Dates of the encampment are July 29 to August 2, inclusive. The cost per Junior attending will be \$4 for the entire camp, the amount to cover cost of food and other costs of camp supplies.

The Marion county organization announced Friday that it would pay \$5 for each county local sending Juniors to camp, the sum to pay their transportation expenses. This is being done to make it possible for as many young folks as possible to get the advantage of the outing.

Classes will be given in public speaking, dramatics, parliamentary law, publicity, handicraft, social ethics and farm history and organization.

Camp activity will center around "The Lodge," a recreation building. Cleowax has an ideal waterfront, with lake fishing, boating and swimming; also an ocean beach and sea bathing. Sports are scheduled to include hiking, volleyball, football, shuffleboard, aerial darts. There will be campfire activity, picnics and programs of indoor and outdoor entertainment. The schedule calls for classes in the forenoons with the afternoon being given over to recreational activity.

Brooks Man Passes His 90th Birthday

BROOKS — B. F. Ramp of Brooks celebrated his 90th birthday July 23. Mrs. Ramp is six years younger. Mr. and Mrs. Ramp operate a fruit and vegetable stand at their farm home on the Pacific highway just north of Brooks.

Mr. Ramp came to Oregon with his parents in a covered wagon from Illinois in 1853. He lived with his parents on Howell prairie three years, then moved to the farm where he now lives.

He taught school for 10 years in Claggett, Mission Bottom and Brooks districts. He recalls the time when his father sold apples for one dollar each, and times when his mother heated water to defend the family from the Indians.

Mr. Ramp was married to Elma Fisher in 1874. In 1883 they moved to Roseburg. Living there nine years, in 1891 they moved to Albany and sold groceries there for eight years, then returned to Roseburg for three years, when they came back to Brooks to live on the farm where they are now living.

They celebrated their golden wedding in 1924. They are the parents of four sons.

Mrs. Ramp was born in Oregon 84 years ago. Her parents came to Oregon in 1852.

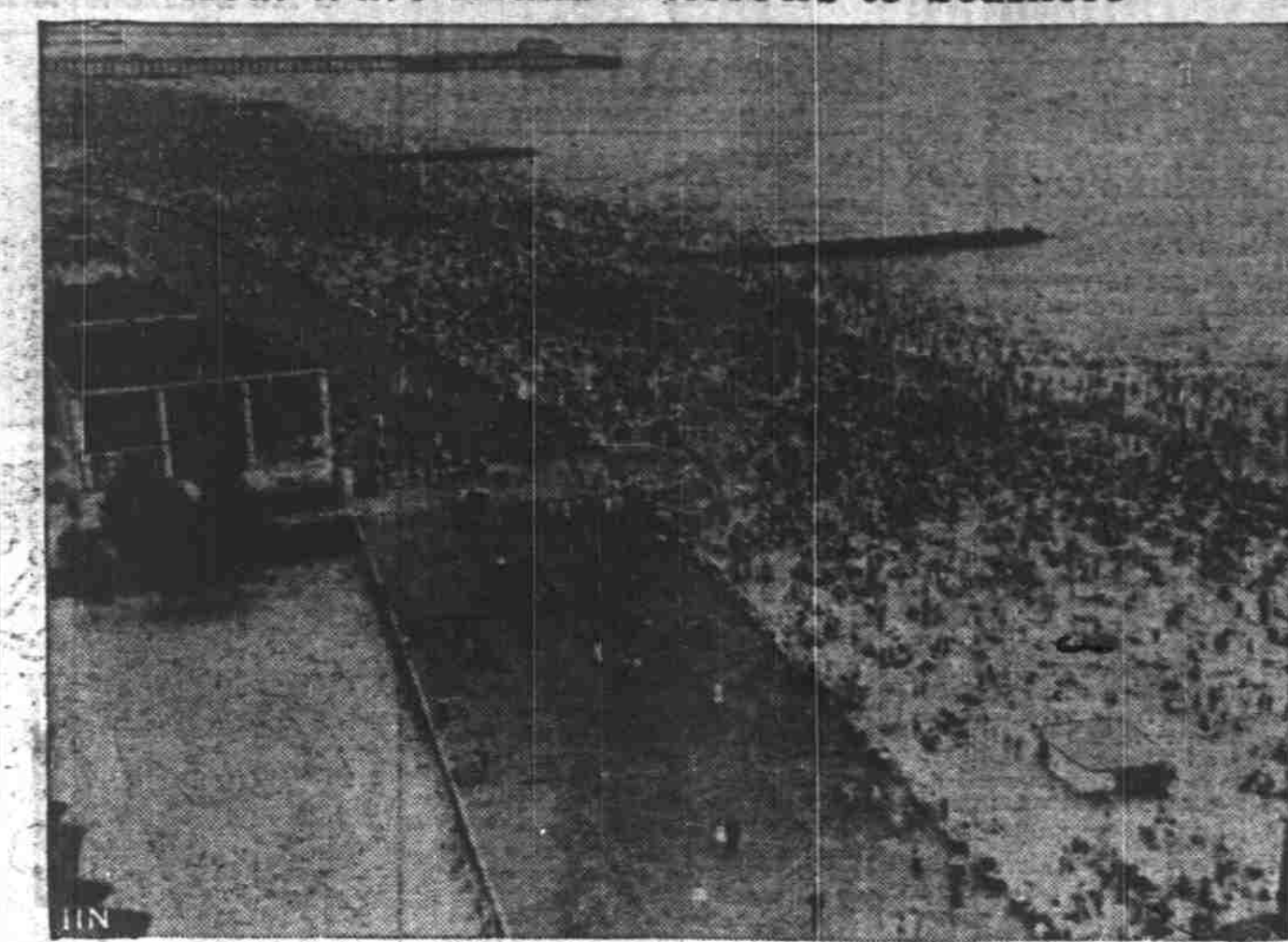
