Child Prodigy Known Here

A seven-year-old girl, hailed as the "violin prodigy of the century," is the daughter of a former Salem musician and the niece of Harry M. Levy of Salem. She is Diana Steiner, who recently gave two private recitals in Portland, and her mother is the former Elizabeth Levy, who was once on the Willamette university faculty and who was president of the Salem Music Teachers' association. Her father is Fern Steiner, well known in Oregon music circles and former principal cellist with the old Portland Symphony orchestra.

Diana's genius was recognized before she was five years old and on the recommendation of Josef Hofman, director of the Curtis Institute of Music at Philadelphia, she was auditioned by Eileen Zimbalist and was accepted in his classes.

This summer Diana and her parents returned to the west and will remain here until late in the fall when they will return to Philadelphia.

Because of the progress made in two and a half years of study under Zimbalist, Diana's name has been linked with that of Menuhin as a child who is certain to achieve fame as an artist. Despite her extreme youth, Diana plays the same numbers as are chosen by those who have already been recognized as masters of the violin and one of the unfailing comments of critics is that her interpretations reveal a maturity of expression rarely encountered.

The public library offers a number of new and timely books for Salem readers this week. In a book titled "The Patriotic Thing" by William O. Stevens, the American way of life is compared with other nations in government. The author's message is addressed chiefly to the youth of the nation, who are to enjoy and the duties of citizenship we must be willing to perform are two ideas that are stressed. This is truly an inspirational book, especially for young people.

Several new books of a philosophical nature which might also be called books on practical psychology, are now available. David Seabury has written "How to Worry Successfully" in which he admits the deadening effect of a worrying mind, but hastens to point out a clear and convincing way for turning worry into a constructive process by guiding it along the lines of intelligent forethought, which is an essential to a happy and successful life. An American business man has just issued a book which is really a philosophical gem. It is called "Meditations in Wall Street," but is not about Wall Street. It is the wise sayings of a successful man who for some reason has withheld his name from the title page of the book. A sample is "Where you find imagination tracing the outlines, and reason filling in the details, there you have a man."

Two new books written in a manner reminiscent of Orison Swift are "Adventures in Self Help" by F. Hamilton; and "Think and Grow Rich" by Napoleon Hill. These two books are good pep talks which will inspire many readers to greater things.
