

Speaker Says Morale Vital

Exceeds Importance of
Material Defense,
Catholics Told

MT. ANGEL — The annual Catholic day celebration at Champego park attracted about 1500 people from all parts of the valley, among which were more than 50 family groups from Mt. Angel.

Ideal weather made it a fine day for the picnic lunches and the open air program that followed and which was highlighted by talks from Father Alcibi, pastor of St. Mary's church at Mt. Angel and educator and lecturer, Gerald Mason, member of the Oregon parole board, and Mrs. T. J. Brabec, state regent of the Catholic Daughters of America.

Father Alcibi, the principal speaker, speaking of the new dangers to our national security brought on by the struggle in Europe and the resulting gigantic material defense program, said, "When the country needs it, in time of peril, the limit of our giving can only be the all that we have. However, at this time it is not unpatriotic to question the wisdom or the final effectiveness of the present method and means of national defense proposed by our leaders.

"In the last twelve or fifteen years the morale of the army and the nation that supports that army is more important than the number of battle ships and fortifications. The morale of this country is not built in the army or the navy. It is built in our schools, not by more spending of dollars but by thoroughly American education. Our first and most important line of defense is in the border fortifications but in our American schools."

Mr. Mason captured the approval of the audience when he made an eloquent plea for better understanding of crime problems.

He spoke of the necessity, especially on the part of parents, of working for and with American youth. Broken homes were pictured by Mr. Mason as the most frequent cause for crime among the young.

Mrs. Brabec, the last speaker, spoke enthusiastically about the responsibilities and opportunities of Catholic action.

Musical interludes were given by Miss Margaret Thompson and Mr. Pilette of Salem. The program ended with mass singing of "God Bless America." Rev. Fr. Raleigh of Cathlamet was master of ceremonies. The Catholic troops of both the Salem and Mt. Angel Boy Scouts attended in uniform. The remainder of the afternoon was given over to athletic exercises for children and young people with Fred Hecker of Woodburn in charge.
