Mt. Angel Plant to Be Open During Annual Flax Festival

MT. ANGEL—Mt. Angel's flax plant will be one of the show places and the center of more than casual interest to the visitors that come here for the fifth annual flax festival on August 9, 10 and 11. Fred J. Schwab, manager of the plant, said there would be tours of the buildings conducted by competent guides who will explain all the different stages of the flax industry.

Indicative of the interest being shown in the educational celebration is the following excerpt from a reply to an invitation sent by Father Alcun, O.S.B., to participate in a specially scheduled flax plant tour: "Believe it or not, Father Alcun, you have answered my prayer. I have been hoping ever since the flax industry was introduced that I would have an opportunity to see into one of those plants."

All machinery at the plant will operate on Saturday, August 10, and the plant will be open for inspection on Sunday also, to enable festival visitors to watch the different processes in the making of linen fibre, from the hauling of flax bundles into the plant to the finished product.

Crippled Man Had Slashed Wrists, Left Note to Brother

SILVERTON — Ole Hage, 55, was found dead Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock in the little shack in which he had been living near the B. Ryan home. At his side was an old-fashioned straight-edge razor and his wrists were slashed. It was judged that he had been dead several hours when found. His brother, Ed Hanson, with whom Hage had had dinner Sunday, made the discovery of the suicide. Hanson said that he had not seen his brother since Sunday so went over to the little shack to see what had become of him.

At the dead man's side was also a note, apparently, officers said, in his own handwriting. It read: "God is my witness. I have never committed any serious crime. What's the use to linger along, broken down and no hopes. Everyone forgive me."

Hage had been crippled some years ago in a logging accident. His one foot had been hopelessly smashed and he was unable to work. Funeral arrangements are in charge of Larson and Son.
