(Continued from page 3) and motor groups will come from north of Mill creek via Cottage. The ninth division will march via Twelfth and Ferry to Fifteenth, disbanding when the bear reaches Fifteenth.

Commanded by Lee Eyerly and his assistant, Eugene McCarthy, the tenth division will be composed of mounted organizations and individuals. Following assembly with its head at the corner of Union and Liberty, facing west and extending east on Union to High, then north on High, this division will proceed east on Court to 17th, thence to the fairgrounds. Mounted and motor units will approach from north of Mill creek via High.

Floats Comprise Last Division. The eleventh and final division, made up of floats, will be commanded by William Rush and assistant, Don Madison. After assembling with its head at the corner of Commercial and Union, facing south and extending north on Commercial, the 11th division will march up Capitol and Marion to Cottage.

All mounted elements of all divisions will go east on Court to Seventeenth and then to the fairgrounds.

Independence Will Survey Its Sewers

John Cunningham Hired to Do Work; Outlet to Be Changed

INDEPENDENCE—At a caucus meeting of the city council held Monday afternoon councilmen agreed to the employment of John W. Cunningham and associates to make a preliminary survey of the sewers of the city. The survey will include extension near the Cooper sawmill and also north Independence.

John W. Cunningham, who was present at the meetings, agreed to make the preliminary survey for \$200 and stated that work would start within the next few days.

According to present plans the sewer outlet will be changed from its present location south of the city to the north near the present garbage dump. The survey is to be complete, showing the costs, so that the plan for the improvement and also the disposal plant may be presented to the voters.

Councilmen agreed that they would pass a resolution covering the survey at the next regular meeting, which will be held Wednesday, August 7.
